STREET CAR MEN ARE NOT TO STRIKE FOR HIGHER WAGES Ogden's street car men, numbering about 165 members of the Amalgamated Association of Street Railway Employees, through their officials, today stated positively they are not even talking of a strike in connection with the renewal of their schedule with the Ogden, Logan & Idaho railroad, which expires May 15. On the contrary, they say a strike, at this time is the last idea ever to be considered in their request for higher wages in the new schedule. "We were misrepresented in the morning paper statement that a strike may be called unless an agreement is reached, etc.," said William Harrington, president of the local union, whose statement was emphatically endorsed by N. Ackerman, of the executive board. "No one has talked of a strike," he said, "and we confidently believe the company will treat us fairly and generously when the schedule is renewed in the next few days. "On account of the high and increasing cost of living, we shall ask for a substantial raise. Our present pay is 25 cents an hour for the first two years; 27 1/2 cents for the next two, and 30 cents after four years. That portion of the morning paper's report was substantially correct. "The company's officials know as well as we do that the cost of living is high and increasing. We are confident of obtaining a better schedule from General Manager William H. Whitney, who has a high reputation for square dealing with his employes." "We notified Mr. Whitney on April 13 that our contract would expire on May 15. This notification was required by our contract. We also sub-

LAKEVIEW DEAL MAY MEAN REDUCTION PLANT

Owners of two-thirds of the 500,000 shares of the Lakeview Mining company, by agreement, have appointed trustees to act as proxies for the Lakeview Mining company to form a new company of 2,000,000 shares; to return to the old company shareholders 500,000 shares of the new company; to put 1,500,000 shares in the treasury and to sell 500,000 shares for \$50,000 for development and equipment. It is stated that sufficient low grade ore is in sight to justify immediate reduction equipment up to 50 tons daily capacity, and on such report the \$50,000 is ready awaiting the organization of the new company, execution and delivery of contracts.
