### SPEAKERS SELECTED FOR THE WEEK OF RECRUITING

Ogden assumed a real military aspect this afternoon, beginning a solid week of public-spirited efforts to recruit at least two hundred men, to be divided among the four branches of the army and navy service. A tall flagpole was erected in the city hall square. It was donated by the Utah Power and Light company. The telephone company erected the pole. The city commission supplied the flag--the finest to be found. Hagbert Anderson, who has raised all official flags here for thirty years, volunteered to receive the tackle and hoist the flag on every occasion. Browning Brothers donated the recruiting tent. Mayor Heywood donated the carpet and the Boyle Furniture company donated the furniture for the recruiting tent. Mayor Heywood ordered the erection of a suitable band and speakers' stand and everything will be ready to start recruiting week with a bang tonight at 7:30 o'clock. The work of the week is in charge of the recruiting committee of the preparation and safety organization. Speakers for Each Night. Judge William H. Friday night--Judge S. T. Corn, chairman; Judge Nathan J. Harris and David L. Stine, speakers. Saturday night--Mayor Abbot R. Heywood, chairman; Senator Joseph C. Chee and William M. McKay, speakers. Soldiers to Assist. Lieutenant J. W. Farley of Troop K and the regular recruiting officers of the army, navy and marine corps will attend each meeting to enlist all volunteers. The officers of Troops B and K will assist in every practicable way. Trumpeters from Troop B will be assigned for the official flag-lowering at sunset each evening. Roy Leishman, in charge of musical programs, was busy today engaging singers and instrumental players for each day. The program every night will contain something unusually thrilling and fine. The patriotic workers are determined to recruit, if possible, the city's full quota of volunteers, maintaining Weber county's patriotic record. ### THOS. W. WOOTTON CALLED BY DEATH

Thomas W. Wootton, one of Ogden's oldest residents, died Saturday night at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. C. W. Adams, 2717 Quincy avenue. He was 89 years old and had lived in Ogden since the early '30s. For many years he was one of the city's best known cobblers, having a little shop at his first home in Barlow lane, where he became very popular and highly respected by young and old in that neighborhood. It was often said of him by parents that his life was highly exemplary and many predictions were made that he, on this account, he would live to a ripe old age. Mr. Wootton was born July 4, 1828, in Chelsea, London, Middlesex, England, and joined the Mormon church in 1852. He came to Utah in 1873 and subsequently filled a twelve months' mission in New York state, where he was joined by his wife and family. The family located first in Salt Lake City, and after a short time came to Ogden. Three years ago Mrs. Wootton died, and Mr. Wootton is now survived by the following children: Mrs. C. W. Adams, Mrs. L. Osborne, Mrs. John Clark, Mrs. Rose Trulock, Mrs. Frank Blair and Charles E. Wootton. Twenty-one grandchildren and twenty great-grandchildren also survive. The funeral will be held Wednesday at 3 p. m. in the Fifth ward chapel, and interment will be in the city cemetery. The body may be viewed at the residence of Mrs. Adams tomorrow afternoon and evening and Wednesday until the funeral hour.

### DONALD E. RHIVERS IN THE ENGINEERS' RESERVE CORPS

Donald E. Rhivers, son-in-law of William H. Wattis, has successfully passed examinations for a captain's commission in the engineers' reserve corps of the United States army. News of his success was received in Ogden yesterday and it is expected he will be given a class A assignment. The class A officers, it is generally understood, will be called into active service within sixty days. Mr. Rhivers is a graduate of the Ogden High school and his home is at 2683 Jefferson avenue. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Rhivers of 1143 Capitol avenue. For several years he has been a superintendent for the Utah Construction company, from which position he offered his resignation immediately after the declaration of war with Germany. He was given a leave of absence and, with his wife and their three children, went to San Francisco to take the military examinations. He has been directed to report at the training camp in the Presidio May 15. Mrs. Rhivers and the children are now visiting relatives at Applegate.
