CONFERENCE ON LIBERTY LOANS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—To perfect Liberty loan organizations throughout the country for the period of the war, Secretary McAdoo today called a conference of representatives of Liberty loan committees in each of the twelve federal reserve districts and of the Woman's Liberty loan organization to be held in Washington December 10.

KINGS SORROWFULLY REVIEW THE WAR

CHRISTIANIA, Nov. 29.—The Scandinavian conference opened yesterday with speeches by King Haakon of Norway and King Gustave of Sweden after which the ministers representing the three nations conferred for several hours. A banquet was held last night. King Haakon, proposing a toast to the visiting monarchs, said to assist the other Scandinavian countries.

JEWISH MISSION TO GO TO PALESTINE

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—Permission to send a Jewish relief and administrative commission to Palestine is being sought from the British government by Zionist leaders in London, it was announced here today by the provisional Zionist committee in this city.

CEMENTING ORIENT TRADE RELATIONS

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 29.—A further cementing of trade relations between China, Japan and the United States through the formation of a Pan-Pacific chamber of commerce has been proposed here. Francis B. Loomis, former assistant secretary of state, is one of the leaders of the movement.

WOMEN CONSERVING SUGAR AT COLLEGES

BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 29.—University of California women students and all others interested may now make clean sweep when it comes to sugar conservation by avoiding the use of sugar entirely except, perhaps, in beverages. Dr. Agnes Fay Morgan of the university has advised the women students that candies and all foods that are made with sugar can be replaced, pulled fudge or boiled with glucose.

PEACE PROPOSAL BY LANDSDOWNE

Letter Causes a Sensation and London Papers Make Many Comments.

LONDON, Nov. 29.—The strongest impetus to a renewal of the heated discussions of the rival schools on the war policy of the allies was provided today from a most unexpected quarter by the publication of a long letter from the Marquis of Lansdowne, strongly pleading for a revision of the allies' war aims and an attempt to secure peace before "the prolongation of the war leads to the ruin of the civilized world."

Lord Lansdowne's plan is a typical representative of the old Tory party. He was a member of Asquith's coalition administration and was secretary for foreign affairs in Lord Salisbury's and Mr. Balfour's ministries. He was viceroy of India and governor-general of Canada. He was the last public man to be suspected of pacifist tendencies.

Lansdowne's long and intimate connection with foreign affairs and diplomacy lends unusual authority to such a pronouncement at the moment of the meeting of the inter-allied conference at Paris and because of Clemenceau's recent declaration against a league of nations, including Germany, and there are indications of embittered controversy over it.

The Evening News demurs against Lansdowne's suggestions on the ground that Germany's word cannot be trusted in any matter and that an attempt to argue with her would be a sheer waste of time.

FOOD SUPPLY OF GERMANY GOOD

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 30.—Speaking in the Prussian lower house today on food conditions, Herr von Waldow, president of the food and rationing board, said the German food supply still would have to bear many restrictions but that an adequate food supply for the coming year was available.

FRESH MILK SOLD DOLLAR A BOTTLE

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Nov. 29.—Fresh milk is sold in beer bottles at \$1 per bottle at Brooks, an Alaskan mining camp up near the arctic circle, according to Judge Charles E. Dunned here from the north.

SCOTCH IN SEATTLE TO HOLD A REUNION

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 26.—Shipwreckers who have piled their trade in the shipyards along the River Clyde in Scotland and who are now working in Seattle ship plants are planning to hold a reunion soon. Many workmen employed here who served their apprenticeship in the Ten Clyde yards of Dalmar, Govan, Whiteinch, Renfrew, Paisley, Clyde Banks, Old Kilpatrick, Bowling, Dumbarton and Greenock.

SOLDIERS FEASTING AT CAMP DODGE

CAMP DODGE, Ia., Nov. 29.—Routine training at this cantonment today while national army men and officers observed Thanksgiving day in feasting, social functions and religious services, both at the camp and in Des Moines.

ONE MAN INJURED

In a derailment on the Tintic branch of the Denver & Rio Grande railway last night, a brakeman named Cole, who is said to be a resident of Provo, was seriously injured and is now in the hospital in that city. Whether or not anyone else was injured, in the accident could not be learned last night, as it occurred between stations several miles west of Spanish Fork, where telegraph facilities are not available.

PHILIPPINES TO SEND MORE MEN

Two More Divisions Ready to Go to France to Battle for Democracy.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 29.—The Philippine Islands are ready to send two more divisions to France to battle for democracy, according to a statement made here by General Thomas L. Hartigan of the Philippine national guard. General Hartigan is visiting this country to give the War department first hand information regarding military conditions in the islands.

TUGS TO HELP IN MOVING THE COAL

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 30.—To enable the moving of more coal to the New England states and to relieve the congestion on eastern railroads the general operating committee of the railroads yesterday asked the government through General Black, chief of engineers and Dr. H. A. Garfield, federal fuel administrator, that more sea-going tug boats be furnished to move boats of shallow draught from the ports of Baltimore, Philadelphia and New York to New England points. The congestion is due, the committee believes, to the commandeering by the navy department of 25 per cent of the seagoing tugs.

Companies operating steamship lines on the Great Lakes were asked by the committee to extend the navigation season as long as possible with a view to relieving the railroads.

The committee at its meeting adopted a resolution asking the eastern sea-ports to organize overseas committees, one for each of the ports of Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Norfolk. The object of these committees is "to secure close co-operation with the allied overseas executive committee and with the United States authorities and thereby obtain the best results in the rail movement of overseas traffic."

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TRAIN LEAVES RAILS

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ANCIENT CHINESE WALL TORN DOWN

Two Thousand-year-old Canton Defense to Give Way for Trolley Line.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 29.—The two thousand-year-old walls of Canton, China, which withheld many an onslaught of Tartar brigands, are being torn down to make way for a trolley line.
