FIRST MEETING OF SUPREME WAR COUNCIL OPENS IN THE CITY OF VERSAILLES TODAY

VERSAILLES, France, Dec. 1.—The first meeting of the supreme war council, which will consider the whole war situation, will be held in a hotel today. It was attended by Premier Lloyd George and General Wilson for Great Britain, Colonel House and General Bliss for the United States, Premier Clemenceau and General Foch for France and Premier Orlando and General Cadorna for Italy. Members of the council set in session, the hotel being guarded carefully by police to keep out intruders.

It is expected that the deliberations will last several days and will result in the formulation of a joint military policy for the western front. A. H. Frazier, secretary of the American embassy in Paris, assisted Colonel House.

All the other American delegates to the inter-allied conference with the exception of Thomas N. Perkins, who was detained by business, attended a luncheon today given by the French foreign minister, Stephen Pichon, at the foreign office to all the delegations to the conference. It is expected the work of the committees will be concluded today. One of the members of the American mission expressed the opinion that the conferences would be productive of far-reaching results.

TREASURER'S OFFICE SWAMPED WITH BUSINESS

Taxpayers rushed to the court house this morning in such numbers that the force of clerks could not care for all who stood in line by 12 o'clock noon, which was the hour set for the beginning of delinquency and, according to a strict interpretation of the law, those who were not given receipts before that time should be classed as delinquents. Inasmuch as many had stood in line from a comparatively early hour in the morning, however, the time was extended to include them all.

Files of taxpayers reached from the treasurer's window clear to the doors of the court house. Many women with babies had to drop out of their places to rest themselves in nearby chairs.

There is a three or four days' accumulation of mail in the treasurer's office which the force has not had time to open because of the rush of business. Treasurer Hulsh stated that those who paid their taxes by mail will be given receipts as soon as the office can get through the work confronting it now and take time to open the mail.

Shaw stated that he had two pint bottles in his pocket and there was a half pint bottle on the table when the officers arrested him. The trial was continued from yesterday so that the officers could locate a man named Piper, from whom Shaw said he obtained the liquor, but Piper has left the state.

In passing sentence, Judge Barker stated that this was the last alternative sentence he would give for this offense, unless there were extenuating circumstances. He said he is determined to put a stop to the practice indulged in of bringing liquor into Utah from the neighboring states where there is no excuse for not knowing that Utah is dry.

A. W. MALONE JOINS SIGNAL SERVICE AND IS CALLED EAST

A. W. Malone, one of the best known construction engineers in this part of the United States and superintendent of the Phoenix Construction company, has enlisted in the signal service of the United States army for special detail work in France. He will leave Ogden for Washington immediately. Suggestive of Mr. Malone's importance and his thorough patriotism, he

is resigning a \$4000 a year position to help the United States government make the world safe for democracy. It is understood that his duties in France will consist of supervising the construction of telephone systems in the trenches. It is not known when he will sail but it is thought it will be "from an Atlantic port" probably before the holidays.

Mr. Malone supervised the overhead work on the G. L. & I. between Brigham City and Preston, and at the time of his resignation he was directing the construction of the pole line of the Utah Power & Light company, between Grace and Salt Lake City. He has been identified with many large construction enterprises.

His offices have been in the Griffin building on Wall avenue.
