LEISHMAN TO SEND A PICTURE BY HIS CODE SYSTEM

As an experiment with one of his new picture transmission inventions, Leroy J. Leishman, Ogdan inventor, will send a photograph this afternoon to New York City and return. The photograph is that of President Woodrow Wilson and it will be sent in code and returned to Ogdan in code and reassembled probably in Mayor Heywood's office.

The method to be used in this system makes use of a sheet drawn with lateral and longitudinal lines, so that these are something over 72,000 small squares on it, with letters and figures at the sides which designate certain squares. The letters and figures are sent over the telegraph line and when received denote different degrees of shading to be used in drawing the picture.

The process is chiefly valuable in that it will enable one to send a picture," said Mr. Leishman today, "in a few hours that would ordinarily take several days, a picture for instance, of the recent Halifax disaster being sent to San Francisco."

The code will be sent over the Postal Telegraph company, the distance to and from New York being 4856 miles, nearly one-fifth the circumference of the earth, and the time for the entire process is expected not to exceed five hours.

GEORGE BECK A CADET IN FLYING SCHOOL AT BERKELEY

George Beck of Ogdan, 1506 Twenty-fourth street, who is a cadet in the flying school of the United States government at Berkeley, Cal., is in the city for a few days on a furlough. Mr. Beck has been at the Berkeley school for some time and lacks about three weeks of completing his course of ground work.
