

CITY MAY COMPEL THE REPAIRING OF ENTIRE DISTRICT

The city commission received a report this morning from City Engineer Joseph Tracy concerning the condition of the paving in paving district No. 122 on Lincoln avenue, from Twenty-fourth street to Ogden river. The report shows that the J. P. O'Neill construction company was notified on June 20, 1917 to make the necessary repairs, but that no attention was paid to the notification.

The commission adopted the report which advises that the city may demand the repairs necessary or the repairing of the entire district in its discretion, according to the contract of that district. Some interesting moves on the part of the city may develop. The report of the city engineer is as follows:

To the Board of Commissioners of Ogden City, Utah, Gentlemen: On the 29th day of June, 1917, I notified the J. P. O'Neill Construction company in connection with their contract for paving district No. 122, being on Lincoln avenue between Twenty-fourth street and Ogden river, to make the necessary repairs to the work in order that the same might conform with their guarantee for said district; especially did this refer to the defective pavement at the intersection of Twenty-third street and Lincoln avenue on the east side and on the west side between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets.

"As yet no answer to this communication has been made nor had any effort been made, so far as I can see, to have said repairs made. Therefore, in accordance with the contract for this district, it is understood and agreed that the determination of the necessity of repairs shall rest with the board of commissioners whose decision upon the matter shall be final and binding upon the contractor, and further, whenever in the judgment of the said commissioners said work or any part thereof shall be in need of repairs or rebuilding, they shall cause a written notice to that effect to be served upon the contractor and bonding company, and further, that the contractor shall immediately undertake to complete such repairs or rebuilding and, upon the contractor's failure to do so, then ten days from the date of service of said notice the city is authorized to have said repairs made and the cost of such repairs shall be paid by the contractor together with 25 per cent in addition thereon as stipulated damages for such failure on the part of the contractor to make such repairs.

I, therefore, respectfully recommend that the board of commissioners serve the necessary notice upon the contractor and bonding company to make these repairs or rebuild the pavement, as the board sees fit. Respectfully submitted, (signed) JOSEPH M. TRACY, City Engineer.

KNITTING MACHINE IS TO MAKE SOCKS FOR THE SOLDIERS

The Forest service auxiliary of the Red Cross, of which Mrs. L. F. Kneipp is president, is planning on carrying the work on a larger scale, especially in the matter of knitting for the soldiers. This auxiliary has a good record in the making of bandages at the Red Cross rooms. Mrs. Edward Howes is chairman of the bandage committee and Mrs. A. C. McCain is chairman of the gauze committee of the Red Cross work. These committees have made, since the latter part of January, 2081 mullin bandages and 2358 gauze bandages, for which they were thanked by Rev. John Edward Carver, president of the Red Cross Weber county chapter. Arrangements are being made to enlarge the work of making garments and a room will be given to this auxiliary for headquarters at the forest service building. The women expect to install a knitting machine this week to make socks, instead of making them by hand.

NEBRASKA TO DEAL WITH SEDITION

LINCOLN, Neb., April 3.—The house of the Nebraska legislature today passed a bill to prevent sedition in this state. The measure, which now goes to the senate, proposes a maximum penalty of twenty years in prison and a fine of \$10,000 for persons convicted of violating the provisions of the act. Persons who attempt to hinder prosecution of the war, either by word or act, would be guilty of sedition under the terms of the bill. The measure would also make it unlawful for any person to conceal from the authorities information relative to acts of sedition.

SOLDIERS WHO ARE TO WORK ON FARMS

WASHINGTON, April 3.—An outline of the procedure by which soldiers may be furloughed for work on farms was made public today by the war department.

Applications may be made by the soldiers themselves, their relatives or by farmers desiring their service. When application is made by farmers, it is provided that the men must be willing to accept the furloughs and that the traveling time from their post to the places of labor will not exceed 24 hours. Farmers are advised to make formal application through the office of the provost marshal general.
