Moderate temperature. Northern Rocky mountain and plateau region: Showers first of week and again about Friday. Temperature above normal, although cooler in northern portions Thursday or Friday.

RAILROAD MEN ARE TO RECEIVE INCREASE BY MONTHS HEAVY RAINS HAVE FALLEN IN IDAHO DISTRICTS

The railroad companies are preparing to pay the increase due the employees since January 12 under the order of Director-General McAdoo, although the clerical work involved in ascertaining the amount due to each employee is causing some delay. The Southern Pacific employees will not get their increase in a lump sum, as they had expected, but will receive it in separate checks for each month, dating back to January, the back pay being distributed as fast as the pay-rolls can be made up at the local office and sent to San Francisco. The checks will be issued from that city. The January increase checks are expected to arrive in Ogden next week. The checks for the following months, up to June 1, will come in as rapidly as the office force can make up the special pay rolls.

W. H. Taylor, chief clerk of this division of the Railway Mail service, has returned from Idaho where he was called a few days ago to attend to some routes that had been isolated by the high water in the Snake river. Mr. Taylor states that heavy rains have fallen in Idaho during the past few days, a steady downpour falling for twenty-four hours at one period. The high water in the river was caused by melting snows in the mountain and the Snake River was falling when he departed from that district yesterday. Mr. Taylor will go back to Idaho to attend to the mail routes that are still cut off.
