STAMP CAMPAIGN IS TYPHOID RAGING AMONG SOLDIERS IN GERMAN ARMY

The savings stamp campaign in the booths erected and opened in different banks and stores of Ogden yesterday brought a total of \$16,696.84 in cash and pledges. During the day quite a competition was worked up between the young women in charge of booths in the city banks, the Ogden Drug Store and the dry goods stores. The greatest sales record of the day was made by the booth in the Ogden State Bank, Miss Dorothy Wright, chairman, which disposed of \$4,950 worth of stamps.

The booth in the McIntyre Drug Store, Mrs. Joseph Scowcroft Jr., chairman, disposed of \$565 in pledges. The booth in Paine & Hurl's dry goods store took 144 pledges for stamps in various quantities. Good records were reported from other booths and sources also.

Mrs. Phillip Kniseley reported today that the young women are entering the campaign with a determination to aid the city in "going over." A check of the total receipts to date showed that the amount is quite a bit short of the apportionment and added efforts will have to be applied to bring the district out successfully.

Continue Until Ended. It was originally announced that the drive would end by tomorrow but a message was received yesterday by the committee in charge from State Chairman Collins showing that all officials and people working in the campaign would be drafted for service until the apportionment is raised. This message follows: "Chairman Underhill of the War Savings committee has advised us to hold all committees in each county until that county has its full allotment. He has drafted us to do the work successfully, the same as President Wilson has drafted the boys in the trenches. It is win the fight or die, every man and woman in the county to be listed. If pledge is not large enough, stay on the job until it is large enough. Washington refuses to permit a failure in any county and holds the county committee responsible for the full performance of its duties. Sixteen counties in Utah over the top today. Utah will win. If Weber is behind draft every committee man until the work is successfully done."
