## MONEY PROGRAM NOT TO CHANGE

### Country's Expenses Will Continue at Rate of Billion and Half Monthly.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Peace will have no great effect immediately on the government's internal financial program.

Treasury officials said today that expenses of about a billion and a half dollars a month are expected to continue through the winter with another war loan in the spring and that the billions of dollars to be provided by the pending revenue bill will be collected just the same next June.

Loans to allies will not be shut off, but if the call for aid from those governments continues many months, it will be under a new program providing for peace and reconstruction loans. The government's policy for assisting in the financing of the great task of rebuilding war torn sections of Europe is not yet formulated.

The government's financial agent in many important reconstruction measures will be the war finance corporation, whose powers congress will

shortly be asked to broaden to enable it to advance further to enterprises essential for peace, the industries converting from war to normal production and possibly even rebuilding ventures. Expenditures, appropriations and bond issues and taxation were discussed today informally between leaders of congress.

## Deaths and Funerals

Terry, Bishop Robert McFarland and Mrs. Georgina Mariott. Music was furnished by Albert Powell, who sang "My Father Knows," and Mrs. Cora Cowan, who sang "I'll Go Where You Want Me To Go." The invocation prayer was given by President L. W. Shurtliff, of the Weber stake, and the grave was dedicated by Bishop Lawrence Slater. A large attendance was present to pay the last respects to the aged man's memory.

**CAMPBELL**—Funeral services for Torry Campbell were conducted at the grave in the Ogden city cemetery at 3 p. m. yesterday by Bishop D. H. Ensign. Bishop Thomas Ward of North Ogden delivered the funeral address. The grave was dedicated by Parley T. Wright.

## NO LET-UP IN WAR ACTIVITIES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—There will be no let-up of the activities of any of the four principal non-military agencies—the war industries board, the war trade board and the food and fuel administrations—with the end of fighting.

The food and fuel administrations continue under the Lever act until the president determines peace after ratification of a treaty by the senate. They automatically go out of existence then. There is still need for conservation of fuel and officials said today there probably will be no great lessening of fuel conservation measures for some months to come.

Because of the need of feeding the released peoples of northern France, Belgium, central and southern Europe and the Near East, the food administration's activities must continue.

# DRAFT CALLS STOP

## General Crowder Cancels All Outstanding Orders and Troop Movements.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—By order of President Wilson, Provost Marshal General Crowder today ordered the cancellation of all outstanding draft calls, stopping the movement during the next five days of 252,000 men and setting aside all November calls for over 300,000 men.

Preparations were made immediately after news of the armistice came for cancelling the November draft calls, under which nearly 200,000 men are ordered to camp between today and Friday. Some of the men were moving this morning and they cannot be stopped until the general staff gives the order.

General March called the staff together to consider the question as soon as he reached his office.

A small number in eastern states commenced enrolling at 6 a. m. today for commitments under the call and the cancellation comes too late to affect their status. They will be considered as in the army until demobilized. Men not yet entrained whether specially inducted or assembled by general call for whom the day and hour of service has been set by draft boards will be considered as honorably discharged, and so paid.

Calls for the navy and marine corps are not affected by the cancellation and entrainments of men for these services will continue as ordered. Draft boards will continue classification of registrants of September 12.

Secretary Daniels today announced no immediate step would be taken toward demobilizing any part of the naval forces of the United States.

It was hinted at the navy department that the United States, the world's richest nation and the least sufferer from the war of all the great powers, might be called upon to do the greatest share of navy police work for enforcement of armistice terms.

Secretary Baker later announced that so far as practicable all men who have been called and who have not yet completed their training, will be immediately turned back to civilian life.

"To the extent that we can, we will turn back those men who have been entrained and have not yet reached training camps."

It is pointed out that the war work will continue and that the draft machine will remain in readiness to function again, however remote the possibility of its necessity.

One call for ten thousand men to join the navy is now being prepared by the provost marshal.

The serum prevents the Spanish influenza and is supposed to kill early pneumonia. There was enough serum in the shipment by about fifteen patients.

Upon receipt of the serum, Dr. Worrell immediately left for the homes of several cases that were in need of immediate treatment.

## EXAMINATION FOR FOURTH CLASS POSTMASTER

The United States civil service commission has announced an examination to be held at Lucin, Utah, on December 14, 1918, as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth class postmaster at Lucin and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill any vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$270 for the last fiscal year.

Applicants must have reached their twenty-first birthday on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a state where women are declared by statute to be of full age for all purposes at 18 years, women 18 years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the postoffice for which the examination is announced. The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application blanks, Form 1753, and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at the place of vacancy or from the United States civil service commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the commission at Washington, D. C., at the earliest practicable date.

## Army Canteens as Baptismal Founts

PARIS, Nov. 11.—Some of the American army chaplains have been compelled to use army canteens as baptismal founts for lack of better equipment to baptize the soldiers before going into battle. So far as known this method is an invention of William C. Levere, C. Levere, secretary and for several years national president of the Sigma Kappa Epsilon fraternity. Mr. Levere established a distributing station near the front which has nothing more than a roof, without walls. The place formerly was a beer garden.

One day, when troops were moving up toward the front, an army chaplain wandered in and offered to baptize any of the boys who had not been baptized and wanted to be. Some of them took him up and then the chaplain discovered that he had no altar and no baptismal font.

"I'll fix that," said Levere, and he did. He stacked three rifles with bayonets fixed and in the center hung an army canteen for the baptismal water. Twenty men were baptized.

## American Delegations Settle Many Affairs

LONDON, Nov. 11.—Arrival of numerous American delegations in London recently, under the guidance of the British Ministry of Information, has revived among American business men in London plans for exchange of business delegations. The bodies now arrived represent labor, the press, Congress, the government, social workers, etc., but not business.

It is stated that last spring the American Chamber of Commerce in London presented a plan to Washington for business delegations which it was urged would tend toward the removal of many misunderstandings and toward friendly co-operation, but the plan was not favored by the American government at that time.
