Miss Ivine Shields' Blind Pupils Who Are To Appear In An Operetta Next Friday Evening at the Blind School Chapel



Probably outclassing the event of last year will be the musical of next Friday evening when at the chapel for the blind, Miss Ivine Shields will present her pupils of the blind department in an operetta and chorus with fancy dances and solo numbers. The little folks have been very carefully trained and there will undoubtedly be a large number of Ogdentians present at eight o'clock when the program will be given.

The first part of the evening will be given over to the staging of an operetta, "The Golden Sickle," by Marzio in which sixteen little folks will appear in dainty costumes. For the second part of the program Miss Shields has trained a chorus of thirty-five voices, composed entirely of the pupils of the blind department, with the exception of Mr. D. J. Thurman who will sing the tenor part. The chorus work is exceptionally difficult and the selections to be given are those which have been sung by professional. Several Scotch, English and Irish folk songs interspersed with other special numbers will be included on the program. The folk songs are those which have been arranged especially for chorus work by Louis Victor Saar and will probably be very entertaining.

The little students have rehearsed their operetta, solo numbers and choruses and are all in readiness for the presentation to which the public is invited and for which no charge of admission will be made.
