MASTER SPY'S WORK REPORTED

Sent Berlin Formula of Deadly Mustard Gas That Poisoned Thousands.

NEW YORK, April 25.—Under "the master spy," Dr. Hugo Schweitzer, German agents in this country, reported to Berlin by code every detail of America's business life, kept from the allies four million, five hundred thousand pounds of explosives and sent overseas the formula for the deadly mustard gas which had low thousands of American soldiers, according to Francis P. Garvan, alien property custodian, who spoke at the annual banquet of the national cotton manufacturers' association tonight.

"True it is that the Hamburg American line and the North German Lloyd kept faithful tabs for Berlin on a thousand details of our business life which came under their observation; that not a ship left our harbors, not a cargo was loaded or unloaded, but that some member of its organization watched and reported every detail to be sent by code to the German government," said Mr. Garvan.

Greatest of All Spy Work. "But, greater than all, and forming the foundation of her entire espionage and propaganda system, stood the dye industry. As long as you were supplied by the 'big six' your business had no secret unknown to Berlin. In Berlin you will find a card index system which recites every fact connected with each and every one of your concerns that can be of any possible value to your rivals over there.

"The head of that system in this country for years before the war was Dr. Hugo Schweitzer, president of the Bayer company. He was given his secret service number by the imperial minister of war—963,192,637. He came to this country, became a citizen on the instructions of the German government, eventually was made the head of the Bayer company and led the espionage and propaganda movements here down to the day of his death in November, 1917.

Inventor of Mustard Gas. "At Bogota, N. J., in the New Jersey Agriculture Chemical company, Dr. Schweitzer employed Dr. Walter Scheele, who there invented mustard gas, the formula of which he transmitted through Captain von Pappen to Germany as soon as the war broke out. This is the mustard gas which laid low your brothers on the plains of France.

A resolution demanding that "all government restrictions on private business, not found necessary before the war, be immediately removed," was adopted as the closing act of the convention today.

GERMAN ENVOYS HAVE FULL POWER

Can Sign Peace Treaty on the Spot, But National Assembly Must Sanction.

BERLIN, April 25. (By the Associated Press)—Prof. Walther M. A. Schuecking, one of the German delegates to the peace congress at Versailles, declared today that the powers of the German delegates would be quite sufficient to enable them to sign the peace treaty on the spot. Naturally he added, the national assembly must sanction the treaty.

Former Police Chief Liberated. BERLIN, April 25. (By the Associated Press)—Herr Eichhorn, formerly chief of police of Berlin, was arrested Thursday at Halberstadt, Prussian Saxony, but was liberated by workmen after a fight lasting three hours, according to advices received here.

A dispatch from Berlin under date of April 19 said that official confirmation had been received of the arrest of Eichhorn by German government troops near Holzminden after his attempt to escape by airplane when Brunswick was captured by government forces.

Eichhorn fled from Berlin early in the year during the revolutionary outbreak and later was reported to be aiding the separatist movement in Brunswick.

Burleson Makes Attacks on the Propagandists

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Postmaster-General Burleson tonight continued his attacks against what he recently termed an organized effort to destroy him. He issued a statement reiterating charges that criticisms of his administration were not designed to work improvements in the postal and wire service but to obtain the repeal of the zone system of rates on second class mail matter. The postmaster-general said the issue arising from the criticisms presented a test which he welcomed.

"The news reaches the postmaster general this morning," said Mr. Burleson, "that 'Mr. Burleson's methods' as applied to the postal and wire service will be the subject matter of discussion today by the American Newspaper Publishers' association.

"While this association is putting in the entire day talking about Mr. Burleson and his methods, the thoughts of certain selfish members thereof during that time will not be on Mr. Burleson's methods or on desired improvements in the postal and wire service, but on their share of the 72,000,000 dollars they have been enjoying as an annual postal subsidy for many years, and as to how they may recover the part of which they were deprived by congressional action and how to remove the danger of losing more of it. There may be little said by them about this legalized graft, but it will be uppermost in their minds just the same.

"It is now insisted that this issue be not obscured to deceive the American people. The real issue is whether certain newspapers and magazines shall continue to filch from the postal revenue seventy-two million dollars each year and impose that burden upon other users of the mail. This presents a test. I welcome it."

Italians Request Allied Nations to Join Demonstrations

LONDON, April 25.—Dispatches from Rome say the newspapers of that city report that the following circular was distributed in large numbers Friday in all parts of Rome frequented by officers and men of the allied armies. "The Italian people, while reaffirming friendship for the peoples of Great Britain, France and the U. S., invite citizens of allied nations now staying in Rome to participate in a demonstration to be made on the arrival here of the Italian peace delegation from Paris."

ROME, April 25.—Demonstrations in protest against President Wilson's attitude relative to Fiume and the Dalmatian coast continued here today with increasing enthusiasm. In all the chief towns of Italy, there were parades and demonstrations. Crowds carrying flags and placards bearing inscriptions such as "Viva Italia," "Viva Fiume" and "Viva Dalmatia," marched through the streets. One placard read "Italy alone will settle her own affairs."

ROME, April 25.—Immediately after his arrival here tomorrow Premier Orlando will confer with King Victor

Emmanuel. He then will hold a council of ministers and make a report of occurrences in Paris. At that meeting a decision will be reached whether to convoke parliament immediately or to leave unchanged the date of meeting which has been fixed, May 6th.

Gila River Project Decided and Acres Will Be Reclaimed
