

STATE SCHOOL FOR DEAF AND BLIND ANNUAL EXERCISES TO WHICH PUBLIC IS INVITED

The commencement exercises at the State School for the Deaf and Blind will be held next Wednesday, and will be attended by Governor Simon Bamberger and other notables from out of town, as well as by many prominent citizens of Ogden and other parts of the state.

The program for this year will depart from that of previous years and will be in the character of an exhibit of the school and shop work in the afternoon, from 2 to 5 o'clock, in order that visitors may gain an insight into the work that has been accomplished.

Some of the students have made wonderful strides in learning from books, and in the craftsmanship courses in spite of their handicaps, have made great progress.

Out of town visitors will be Governor and Mrs. Bamberger, Attorney General and Mrs. Dan B. Shields, Dr. E. G. Gowans, superintendent of public instruction; C. Clarence Neston, president of the board of trustees, as well as the board members.

Graduates of the school for the deaf are Elsie Lamb, Farmington; Katie Jones, Malad, Idaho; Carlos Seegmiller, Ogden; Rufus Elven, Salina, School for the blind graduates are Nellie Payton, Ogden; Irene Jones, Malad, Idaho.

Five more pupils will complete the eighth grade in the school for the deaf and eight will graduate from the eighth grade in the school for the blind.

City to Buy Car For Use of the City Engineer

In order to take field engineering parties to the public improvements works which are now getting under way, the city will purchase a Ford car.

This matter came up for discussion at a special meeting of the city commissioners this morning when a report and recommendation of City Engineer Joseph Tracy was submitted, adopted and referred to the superintendent of streets with power to act.

Following is the recommendation of the engineer: "In connection with the large public improvements program for this year, and especially that of the outfall sewer, it will be necessary, in order to expedite the work, that a conveyance of some sort be provided for field parties as they will have considerable distance to travel each day.

"I, therefore, request that the engineering department be provided with a five-passenger Ford car. If we do not buy a machine, it will be necessary to hire a conveyance, and I believe the purchase of a machine by the city will be cheaper."

WATER PIPES SHOULD BE LAID BEFORE PAVING

In order to avoid taking up pavement after streets are paved, the following recommendation was made this morning by City Engineer Joseph Tracy, and the matter was referred to the waterworks department with power to act.

"Ogden city has gained jurisdiction for the paving of Twenty-fourth street between Washington and Harrison avenues, Harrison avenue between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets and Brinker avenue between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth street, known as paving district No. 129.
