LONDON, May 26.—Memorial Day wreaths will be placed by the Knights of Columbus on the graves of all American soldiers, sailors or marines who were buried in the British Isles during the war. There were nearly 3000 deaths in the American forces at hospitals and camps in England, Scotland and Ireland. There will be a wreath for each grave with the name of the dead soldier or sailor and this inscription: "He died that we might live. In grateful memory from his fellow countrymen. The Knights of Columbus of the United States, May 30, 1919."


WILLARD WILL BE ON HAND.
