**ELECTRIC LINE MAY BE BUILT  
 FROM OGDEN, ALONG 21ST STREET,  
 TO DISTRICT WEST OF CITY**

Further action on the tentative proposal to build an electric line from the main part of Ogden City through Wilson Lane, to serve the residents of West Ogden, with a possible continuation of an interurban line through West Weber, Warren and on to Plain City, will be taken within a few days, according to an announcement of President John S. Lewis of the Merchants of Ogden.

It was stated this morning that the merchants' organization has been working for some time on the proposition of getting street car accommodations for the people of West Ogden and the Wilson Lane district, including the section surrounding the sugar factory, and there is now a good prospect that some tangible result will be obtained in a short time.

The merchants have been waiting for the return from California of W. A. Whitney, general manager of the street railway system and the Utah Idaho Central Railroad company. Mr. Whitney is back and a meeting of interested citizens and business men will be held as soon as S. S. Jensen, superintendent of the Ogden Packing & Provision company, returns from Chicago, where he was called a day or two ago. Mr. Jensen is expected within a few days, and when he arrives, Mr. Lewis and his committee will call a mass meeting of the Wilson Lane and West Ogden people and others who are interested.

The former plan, to build a line over the Twenty-fourth street viaduct across the railroad tracks, has been entirely abandoned and the route by way of Twenty-first street over the Weber river is now most favored.

When the meeting is held there will be in attendance a number of men who are influential in business and financial circles in this city, and they will discuss the proposition to not only build a street car line to serve the residents of the west side, but also the feasibility of a commercial line through the districts mentioned so as to provide rail transportation of beets and other crops from the outlying districts to the sugar factory and the canning factories of the city. The freight possibilities of the interurban line through West Weber and Warren to Plain City, completing a loop of the rich farming district by connecting with the line that runs north to Harrisville and then to Plain City, are being given considerable attention by men with money to invest, and it is believed that, if the line is agreed upon, it will be comparatively easy to finance the construction and equipment.

**FIREMAN WOODS TO BE  
 BURIED 2:30 P. M.  
 TOMORROW**

That the boiler explosion on Union Pacific engine No. 5008 yesterday, in which Engineer Thomas Carroll, Fireman A. H. Woods and Headbrakeman Charles Hobbs were instantly killed, was due to lack of water, was the belief expressed by railroad officials this morning. The accident occurred yesterday morning at Curvo, Utah, near Castle Rock, at about 4:15 o'clock.

Union Pacific safety officials and claim agents are on the ground making a detailed investigation to ascertain whether the accident was caused by carelessness on the part of the crew or faulty mechanism.

Further information received here states that the violence of the blast drove the engine 300 feet from the scene and lifted the boiler cab and upper structure of the engine and tender from the trucks with such force as to land it in a mass of wreckage some 220 feet from the place where the accident actually happened. 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**DRIVE FOR \$3000 FOR  
 SALVATION ARMY  
 BEING MADE**

The drive for \$3,000 which the Ogden lodge of Elks is making in the Salvation Army campaign for the Home Service fund is under full swing, and it is reported by Harold Packer, executive chairman of the campaign, that the response of the public is very gratifying.

"Our committee called upon one business man this morning who said to put him down for \$10. This sounded fine and the head of the committee man shook a little from fear lest the benefactor change his mind. But when that sum was written the business man again said put down \$15, this to be for the firm; the first donation was his own personal contribution. We are finding such support that it now looks as though the drive will go over the top in about four days. Nobody seems to want to refuse to give to this cause. The Salvation Army certainly has won a place in the hearts of the people."

Regarding the purposes of the drive Chairman Packer said last night: "In the matter of funds the Salvation Army now is trying to raise \$3,000 in Ogden and Weber county to carry on its work of reconstruction. The money will not go outside of the county. All of it will be used for home service work here."

"Under the most obstinate conditions in France its workers served our soldiers, but their task is not yet complete. They are taking up with vigor and fortitude the work of reconstruction and readjustment in addition to their regular work of salvaging. In order to carry out their plans, they have inaugurated a home service drive to be held throughout the state."

"An extensive advertising campaign should not be necessary to put the state over the top. If the people realize how the returned service men feel about the service of the Salvation Army rendered them at the front, they will stand squarely back of this drive and make it a marked success. There is no discrediting Yankee fortitude or the patriotism of all Americans."


