

### LETTER FROM SENATOR ON MOTOR CORPS TRAIN

The army motor transport which is to arrive here on August 15th is now west of Cheyenne according to the latest word received. There is now no hope of having the train remain more than over night in this city, as the schedule has been approved by the secretary of war and cannot be changed.

Concerning this fact, a letter was received this morning by President John S. Lewis of the Merchants of Ogden from United States Senator Reed Smoot, who worked earnestly in the interests of this city, and is as follows:

"United States Senate, August 4. "Dear Mr. Lewis: I wish to acknowledge receipt of your telegram of August 2nd, 1919, relative to the schedule of the transcontinental army motor transport corps.

"In answer will state that I immediately got in touch with the officer at the war department, having the schedule in charge, and endeavored to have the schedule changed as it was originally announced. On August 2nd, 1919, I sent you the following telegram, which I now affirm:

"War department states whole schedule has been approved by secretary of war, and advertised accordingly, therefore impossible to revise it. Department first assured me whole day would be spent in Ogden. "I was very much surprised to get the information conveyed in your telegram that the schedule had been changed, so that the army transport would spend only a night in Ogden, instead of a day and a night, as was originally announced. At the time, I was endeavoring to have the department change the routing so as to include Ogden. They informed me they had changed the routing in such a way as to include Ogden, and permit the transport unit to spend a day there. I immediately notified you to that effect.

"It seems the whole schedule was again changed, which was approved by the secretary of war, and the new plan was advertised along the whole route, thus making it impossible to again change it. I regret that they could not spend a day in Ogden, for I believe that this would have done as much to advertise the state as any other one thing."

His sleeve was partially empty, that is from a few inches above the wrist to the end of the sleeve; on his breast he wore a Croix de guerre, with two stars and the palm; while above it were two gold wound stripes and at the shoulder of the left sleeve was the little Indian head symbol of the famous Fighting Second division.
