Interscholastic Gridiron Schedule Made Up Saturday

Coaches of the high school of the interscholastic football league and all other mentors of the secondary schools throughout the state which play football, have been called together at 10 o'clock Saturday morning in the reading room of the Deseret gymnasium by S. Oren Wilson, secretary-treasurer of the Utah High School Athletic association. The business at hand consists of the drawing up of high school football schedules for the 1919 season.

West High, East High, Granite, Jordan, Ogden and Davis county are the old-line members of the football league who always play each other each year. But with the introduction of football into the church school activities and the rapid spread of the game to the smaller high schools of the state, the matter of settling the interesting schedules for the outlying schools, has become a real one. League each include one or two of the other schools on their schedule. This year the state is to be divided into two districts for interscholastic football purposes. The divisions will be known as northern and southern and the dividing line will pass just south of Jordan high school. The divisional winners will close the campaign with a state championship game, if present plans are perfected.

Details and schedules will be worked out at Saturday's meeting. It is expected that besides the usual members, Logan, B. Y. C., Brigham City, Weber academy, Grantsville, Tooele, Park City, Lehi, Spanish Fork, Springville, Payson, Tintic, B. Y. U., others will be represented.

Retail Clothiers To Investigate Manufacturers

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Investigation of the business methods of clothing manufacturers throughout the United States by a committee of retailers was ordered today by delegates to the convention of the National Retail Clothiers' association.

In a resolution which called for the appointment of a special committee to look into the question it was asserted that some manufacturers of clothing have sold on future orders merchandise at certain agreed prices and have subsequently resold and delivered the same commodities at advanced prices and refrained from shipping to the original purchaser.

This alleged tendency on the part of the manufacturer, the retailers say, increases without warrant the material price of clothing and thereby places an additional burden on the consumer.

J. J. Phoenix of Delevan, Wis., told the delegates that there was no possibility of clothing being cheaper during the coming year.




