Case Before Jury.

CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—The government's case against the "big five" packers of Chicago for alleged violation of the Sherman anti-trust law, was taken before the federal grand jury here today. Criminal indictments against officials of the packing companies will be sought, according to attorneys for the government.

A mass of documentary evidence collected since 1916 in various parts of the country by federal agents are ready for presentation to the jury.

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 17.—Attorney-General Palmer said today that if the people over all the country would act forcibly against the "buy now" campaign, they would help materially in solving the problem of high prices.
