STOCKHOLM MOST EXPENSIVE CITY IN ALL EUROPE

LONDON, Aug. 20.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Travelers arriving here from Stockholm after visiting some of the other capitals are firm in their conviction that it is the most expensive city in Europe. The staple coin is a krona, just over 25 cents, and it costs 32 krona for a bed, breakfast and bath in a hotel. The simplest meals cost \$5, and wine is prohibitive at about \$200 a bottle for the worst champagne.

NEBRASKA WHEAT LYING ON GROUND

LINCOLN, Neb., Sept. 19.—Hundreds of thousands of bushels of wheat are on the ground in danger of rotting in western Nebraska because elevators are already filled and because there is a shortage of railroad cars, together with an embargo on wheat shipments to Omaha and Kansas City, according to information reaching Governor Samuel R. McKelvie, who announced he would appeal to the railroad administration to take steps to relieve the situation.

Sale of Lusitania Medal Forbidden In Rhine Area

WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES IN GERMANY, Aug. 27.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press.)—Sale of a reproduction of the Lusitania medal, which for a time was being peddled in the occupied areas, has been forbidden in the Rhine province by the oberpresident. Hundreds of the medals were bought by American soldiers as souvenirs. Writing to Col. I. L. Hunt, officer in charge of civil affairs in the American area, regarding the sale of the medal by Germans the oberpresident says:

"I wish to inform you that such a medal has, of course, never been coined or caused to be coined by any German government. The medal is simply the outcome of misguided thrift and greediness on the part of certain private dealers, who, in a most unwarrantable manner, published this tasteless reproduction and have hawked it about, without considering for one moment, that by so doing, they stimulate the animosity against Germany."

The story generally current with the sale of this issue of the medals was that they were made in Munich by the manufacturer of the original which was issued in 1915 after the sinking of the Lusitania and from the same dies on which the original issue was cast. These dies, according to the story, were ordered destroyed by the German government after but twenty-eight medals had been struck off, but were surreptitiously saved by Karl Guertz, who is reported to have been the designer. The German government has several times denied that state against Nels Peterson, charged with failure to provide for his wife and children, is on trial in the district court before Judge A. W. Agee.

SECRET SERVICE MAN IS TO ARRIVE THIS AFTERNOON AND GO OVER PRESIDENT'S ROUTE

Arrangements for President Wilson's reception in Ogden will be completed this afternoon with the arrival of a secret service representative, who will be taken over the proposed route and he will render his decision. Decorations of homes in the residential district is urged and it is expected that every home along the line of the drive will bear an American flag. School children will all be supplied with flags and the buildings in the business district will be decorated.

President Wilson's party will arrive in Ogden over the Southern Pacific from San Francisco at 2:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The local reception committee will be lined up on the platform from the depot sheds to the train. Ten large motor cars, with tops down, will be used for the president and his party while other machines bearing state, city and county officials, as well as business representatives, will be in the parade. Each of the ten cars will be numbered. The cars, together with their numbers and occupants, follow:

Car No. 1—The president, Mrs. Wilson, two local men. Car No. 2—Secret services men. Car No. 3—J. P. Tumulty, secretary to the president; Admiral T. Cary Grayson, aide to the president, and members of the reception committee. Car No. 4—Charles Swen, Gilbert F. Close, Warren F. Johnson, Edward F. Johnston, Edward W. Smithers, White House staff.

Car No. 5—M. Barries, Underwood news service; C. E. Turnage, Kinod Publishing corporation; Pell Mitchell, Gaumont company, R. E. Nebecker, Miss Alleen Doone, Miss Marion Wright and Miss Dorothy Wright. The concert next Wednesday will be one of the choicest ever given in this city and at a very reasonable admission fee.

It is estimated that there will be about forty machines in line. Streets in the downtown section will be roped off by the police department and guards will be stationed along the entire drive to see that the path of the machines is not obstructed. Vehicles will be removed from the streets and no persons will be permitted beyond the curbing. Upon leaving Ogden, the presidential party will depart for Salt Lake, where the president will address an audience at the Tabernacle at 8 o'clock on Tuesday evening.

It is stated that fully 100 Ogdanites of this city are making arrangements to go to Salt Lake Tuesday evening to hear President Wilson speak at the Tabernacle. The indications are the meeting at Salt Lake will be attended by about 12,000 people.




Large Number to Go to Salt Lake Tuesday Evening
