THREE HUNDRED ALIENS IN AMERICANIZATION CLASS AT CENTRAL JUNIOR HIGH

More than three hundred aliens attended the opening session of classes for the Americanization unit at the Central Junior last night. The work is in direct charge of J. A. Junk, G. J. Reeves, H. Barber, J. W. Wintle, and Mrs. Mary Noall. Regular class work will be held Monday and Thursday of each week.

Work in English, history and physics constitute the card of studies that will be used by the foreigners during the coming season. At the registration last night the foreigners in point of number enrolled as follows: Dutch first; Japanese second; English third; Swedish fourth; Italians fifth; French sixth; Greeks seventh; Croates eighth and Syrians ninth.

HAS PART OF HIS HEAD SHOT AWAY BUT ENJOYS LIFE

Frank Stillwater, a Canadian aviator en route to Vancouver, visited in Ogden for a short while yesterday. Stillwater has the distinction of being one of few surviving soldiers who have had a portion of their head shot away.

While in the Royal Canadian flying corps, Stillwater was brought to earth by a German "Archie" a portion of the bursting shell carrying off part of his skull about four inches square. War surgery and the fitting of a large gold plate enabled Stillwater to continue his existence, although he has to wear a metal appliance resembling a football headgear. The headgear, which consists of brass straps that hold a gold-plated disc over the wound, is removable and is worn merely to protect the owner from any chance bumps that he might encounter.

Stillwater will undergo an operation in which a piece of bone will be drafted to his cranium.

CARLOAD OF TNT IS TO BE USED ON ROAD WORK

One carload of TNT to be used in road construction throughout the forests under the district offices in this city, is expected to arrive here in the near future from Ft. Wingate, Georgia.

The explosive is adapted to hard rock work, it is said, and is much safer than dynamite under normal conditions. In the splitting of hard rock the TNT has proved to be much more valuable than dynamite, black powder or other explosives. The action of the explosive is so quick, however, that it is almost useless for blasting in soft material, the force lifting the material straight into the air so that most of it falls back into the hole made by the explosion.

Upon arriving in Ogden, the carload will be divided for shipments to forest supervisors.

CATTLE INDUSTRY DOOMED UNLESS PRICES RESTORED

CHICAGO, Sept. 23.—Owners of 300,000 head of Kansas cattle, headed by W. T. Stubbs, former governor of that state, yesterday told representatives of the "big five" packers that the cattle industry is doomed unless prices are restored immediately. Thomas E. Wilson, of Wilson and company, in turn suggested establishment of government credits for furnishing foreign nations that would permit sales to those countries and revive faltering prices. The stockmen agreed to this.

Arthur Meeker, of Armour and company, declared "agitation against the packers" had "ruined the packing interests."

The producers said they would appeal to Herbert Hoover at Washington to aid in getting the government to stabilize prices.

Welcome Home Celebration in Salt Lake City

SALT LAKE, Sept. 23.—Governor Bamberger yesterday issued his formal proclamation of the three-day welcome home celebration for service men to be held in Salt Lake, October 8, 9 and 10. Governor Bamberger said that practically all the men who fought in the world war from Utah have returned to their homes, and that the state will pay honor to the men who gave their lives in the service, as well as provide entertainment for the men who returned.

The proclamation follows: "Since the day we sorrowfully, yet proudly, bade you God-speed on your mission to preserve to posterity the ideals of liberty and justice, we have looked forward eagerly to the time when we might be privileged to welcome you home and convey in some degree our deep appreciation of the valiant service you have performed, and to give expression to our thankfulness for your safe return.

"Because of the manner of your home-coming—individually and in small, unorganized groups—it was not practicable to extend to you the reception so richly deserved when you again set foot on the soil of your native state. But the Thirtieth legislature of the state of Utah, appreciating the debt of gratitude due you, has made possible for us the occasion so eagerly sought.

"To carry out the intent of the legislature and to afford us the opportunity so much desired, I have set aside October 8, 9 and 10 for the official welcome by the state to our returned service men. The program will be carried out at Salt Lake and will include, besides expressions of our appreciation, our humble tribute to those who have honored the pages of history by giving their lives in defense of the institutions so dear to a liberty-loving people.

"On behalf of the people of the state of Utah, I extend to every man connected with any branch of the military organization of the United States during the recent world war—soldier,

sailor and marine—to the members of their families and the members of the families of those who gave their lives in the service, a most cordial invitation to meet with us in Salt Lake, October 8, 9 and 10, and make possible to the greatest degree compliance with the wishes of those of us who were denied the privilege of sharing with you the high honor and the glory which comes with service under the Stars and Stripes."

Negroes Endorse Lynching of Man Killed Woman

ATHENS, Ga., Sept. 23.—Negroes at a mass meeting near Lexington, Ga., have endorsed the action of whites in lynching Obe Cox, negro, accused of attacking and murdering the wife of a white farmer. At the time of the crime the negro was under indictment for an attack upon a negroess. He is said to have confessed to both crimes.

News in Brief

PARIS, Monday, Sept. 22.—The deconcentration of the French army is now entirely completed, all troops except those on the Rhine having returned to their garrison posts. The transportation of demobilized soldiers to their homes by regular passenger trains will also be finished in a few days.

Crown Land Status. PARIS, Sept. 23.—The status of the former Austro-Hungarian crown land of Galicia was before the supreme council for discussion this morning. Premier Paderewski of Poland was heard by the council, presenting the Polish view as to the disposition of the territory. (The claims of the Poles and Ukrainians as to Galicia are widely at variance.)

Stephen Pichon, the French foreign minister, presided over the council's session.

More Peace Offers Made. LONDON, Sept. 23.—Via Montreal—Ukraine is another nation to which the Russian soviet government has made a peace offer, according to advices reaching here. Furthermore, it is declared that the delegation which was sent to propose peace to the Ukrainians, announced that the Moscow government had decided to seek peace with all nations in order to forestall a counter revolution in Russia.

The Bolshevik emissaries suggested to the Ukrainians the negotiations of peace on the basis of recognition of the independence of the Ukraine if that nation would maintain neutrality in the soviet struggle against Admiral Kolchak and General Denikin.

Dutch Deny Break.

PARIS, Sept. 23.—Members of the Dutch delegation in this city emphatically deny the reported break in diplomatic relations between Belgium and Holland. Jonkheer Reneke van Swinderen, head of The Netherlands' representatives here, said today to The Associated Press: "Quite on the contrary, I have felt we were nearing an understanding on the questions under discussion."

POLICE ORDER SENT.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Sept. 23.—William J. Milton, grand president of the Fraternal Order of Police, with headquarters in this city, today sent letters to all lodges of the order calling upon the members to use every means within their power to uphold and enforce the laws of the nation, state and municipality at this time of unrest in our country, as they are obligated by their oath of office. Mr. Milton asks that the officers enforce the laws "impartially under all circumstances." The Fraternal Order of Police has lodges in twenty-six cities. It is an independent union, not affiliated with the American Federation of Labor.
