TWO UTAHNS KILLED INSTANTLY AT A CROSSING

BRIGHAM CITY, Oct. 27.—James Nelson, 62, former bishop and wealthy farmer of Perry, and Nephth Moss, 55, cattleman and capitalist of Brigham City and Summit county, were instantly killed near the Perry cannery at 11 o'clock this afternoon when an automobile in which they were riding was struck by an Oregon Short Line passenger train. The bodies of both men were badly mutilated.

Mr. Nelson and Mr. Moss were returning from an inspection of some land near Perry, and the accident was caused by their attempt to drive their car across the track in front of the rapidly approaching train.

For some distance in the locality of the fatality the highway parallels the railroad track and the automobile and train were traveling in the same direction. It is said that the curtains of the automobile were drawn, owing to the inclemency of the weather, and it is believed that the men in the machine were not aware of the approaching train when they endeavored to make the crossing.

The automobile, a brand-new seven-passenger Studebaker car, which had just been purchased by Mr. Moss, was struck squarely in the center by the engine and literally ground to pieces. It is said that Mr. Nelson and Mr. Moss attempted to cross the track from the west side and but for the fact that the fireman of the engine was engaged in shoveling coal he might have seen them and prevented the collision.

Immediately after the accident the bodies of the men were taken from the wreck, the passenger train having stopped. Mr. Nelson's body was taken to Perry and that of Mr. Moss was brought to this city.

Mr. Nelson was born in Ogden, February 3, 1857, the son of James and Marie Nelson, but spent virtually all of his life in this county. For a considerable period he was a bishop of the L. D. S. church at Perry, but of recent years gave his entire attention to his farming interests. He is survived by his widow and seven grown sons and daughters.

Mr. Moss was born at Bountiful in 1864, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Moss. He had been a resident of Brigham City for a long period, but recently purchased a ranch in Summit county, where Mrs. Moss has recently been making her home. Mr. Moss sold his Brigham City home today, a few hours before his death, but his wife had not signed the deed. He was preparing to join his wife at the Summit

county ranch. Mr. Moss had been married twice. His second wife, and nine daughters by his first wife, survive him.

UTAH WILL BE DIVIDED INTO NINE INTERNAL REVENUE ZONES

Recommendations to the commissioner of internal revenue that Utah be divided into nine zones and that Ogden be headquarters of the second zone. The recommendation provides that a general deputy and two field deputies have charge of the work in Weber, Morgan, Daggett and Davis counties. The plan will place Ogden almost equal in rank to Salt Lake as the latter city will be assigned a general field deputy and three other deputies.

Inquiries as to office room available were made recently at the federal building in Ogden in anticipation of this plan. Under the zoning plan a deputy will be placed in each zone in the state and will take care of the business of the district with the exception of the zones in the central part of the state in which there will be a general agent in charge of the zone and two or more field deputies to aid with the work.

The zone which will be recommended by Mr. Dunbar will be as follows:

First zone: Cache, Boxelder and Rich counties with headquarters at Logan.

Second zone: Weber, Morgan, Dag-

get and Davis counties with headquarters at Ogden with a general deputy in charge of the zone and two field deputies.

Third zone: Salt Lake, Summit and Tooele counties, with headquarters at Salt Lake, general field deputy I. H. Hinckley in charge with three field deputies attached to the office.

Fourth zone: Utah and Wasatch counties with headquarters at Provo.

Fifth zone: Carbon, Duchesne and Uinta counties with headquarters at Price.

Sixth zone: Emery, Grand and San Juan counties with headquarters at Green River.

Seventh zone: Juab, Millard, Beaver and Sanpete counties with headquarters at Nephi.

Eighth zone: Sevier, Piute, Wayne and Garfield counties with headquarters at Richfield.

Ninth zone: Iron, Washington and Kane counties with headquarters at Cedar City.

Should the recommendation of Mr. Dunbar be accepted he said it would probably require the addition of a few field deputies to the force allotted the Utah district but that the force at the present time is complete under the allotment of deputies given this district.
