

GREAT BRITAIN AND FRANCE WAIT FOR U. S. ACTION

LONDON, Nov. 19.—Great Britain and France are considering whether they are not compelled to carry out the German peace treaty and operate the league of nations independently of the United States pending the decision of the American government.

It is pointed out that matters are continually arising under the treaty which need immediate attention, such as plebiscite commissions, and it is no longer possible to delay making the pact operative.

The opinion strongly prevails that Great Britain will not accept any reservations made by the United States senate which would necessitate the negotiation of a new treaty.

The belief still exists that the American government will ultimately take its place with the Allies.

Railroads Not to Cut Train Service Down Too Seriously

CHICAGO, Nov. 18.—There will be no drastic general curtailment of train service in the United States at the present time, despite the seriousness of the coal problem. This announcement was made tonight at the conclusion of a meeting attended by Director General Hines, and seven regional directors of the railroad administration. Mr. Hines after hearing reports from the regional directors was of the opinion there was sufficient coal to run the railroads on

a virtually normal basis for 25 or 30 days and that production of bituminous coal was being increased daily. A freight embargo would be the last thought of measure to conserve coal. That the coal situation is serious was admitted by those in attendance at the conference.

Further consideration of the subject will be given during the present week by Mr. Hines and if any curtailment of train service is decided upon, ample notice will be given the public. Coal now in the hands of the railroads under the order of the fuel administration will continue to be distributed to public utilities and other users of coal in accordance with actual necessity.

Director General Hines arrived in Chicago during the afternoon to attend the dinner of the American Railway Guild at which he was the principal speaker. The regional directors were here to attend the meetings of the American Railway association, and the conference was arranged to discuss the problem. At the conclusion, the following statement was given out by Mr. Hines:

"The regional directors and myself having come to Chicago for meetings having nothing to do with the coal situation and arranged some weeks ago, we took advantage of being together to discuss the present coal problem. While it was found that there is necessity for conserving coal just as far as possible, it was decided that no drastic general curtailment of train service would be undertaken pending further consideration of the subject, which will be given during the present week. If such curtailment is decided upon adequate notice will be given to the public. Meanwhile as far as possible coal in the hands of the railroads under the order of the fuel administration will continue to be distributed to public utilities and other users of coal in accordance with actual necessity."

International Gold Fund Proposal Is Meeting Approval

MONTEVIDEO, Tuesday, Nov. 18.—Subject to ratification by the legislature, the Uruguayan section of the international high commission has approved in general the convention proposed by the central committee at Washington for an international gold fund to regulate exchange between Pan-American countries. Two modifications are suggested. One relates to the form of the agreement and the other asks an understanding as to the kind of gold coin to be deposited.

The Uruguayan section also passed resolutions that the delegates should propose at the forthcoming Pan-American financial congress in Washington that North American financial and commercial procedure be adjusted to fit European methods.

Heirs of Bismarck Take Legal Steps Against Publishers

BERLIN, Tuesday, Nov. 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—The heirs of Prince Otto von Bismarck, the "iron chancellor," purpose to take legal steps to halt publication of the third volume of his memoirs on the ground that the publishers plan to violate Bismarck's provision that the volume be in no way curtailed, says the Taegliche Rundschau. The publishers, the heirs declare, intend to omit letters from the former emperor for the publication of which no permission has been given by the deposed monarch.

A meeting of six district foresters, to be held in Salt Lake during the first week in December, has been called by Col. Henry S. Graves, head of the forest service at Washington, D. C.
