

BOBBY MC LEAN LOSES ICE TITLE IN NORWAY

Thousands Witness Feral Races on Championship Card; Other Sport News

CHRISTIANIA, Feb. 8.—Oscar Mathiesen, of Christiania, has won the world's ice skating championship from Robert McLean of Chicago. The final races were held today, and Mathiesen captured both of them—the 1,500 metres and the 10,000 metres. On Saturday the American took the five thousand meter event while Mathiesen defeated him in the 500 meter sprint. The contests were held in cloudy weather, but the ice was in good condition. There was enough wind, however, today to prevent new world records for the distances. The royal family, with the American minister and his wife, were in the royal box. In the 1,500 metre event, McLean started out like a whirlwind, making the first 500 metres in 40.5 seconds. This outclassed Mathiesen's world record of Saturday, which was 43.3-10 seconds. But the American apparently overstrained himself in his burst of speed, and Mathiesen succeeded in passing him and winning by a fraction of a second. In the last contest of the series, the 10,000 metres, McLean was badly beaten. He said that he was handicapped by the air being too light, which interfered with his breathing.

Fight Failure
MADRID, Saturday, Feb. 7.—An attempt to stage a pugilistic bout here last night between Frank Crozier, who was defeated by Jack Johnson in 1916, and a fighter named Nannoff, ended in a dismal failure. The crowd, which filled the hall, treated the fighters much as they would have treated bull fighters, and became so excited that instead of one fight, three dozen fights were proceeding in the hall at the same time. The scheduled fight had to be called off. The referee gave the decision to Crozier.

Match for March
TOLEDO, Ohio, Feb. 8.—The world's championship boxing bout between Jimmy Wilde and Frankie Mason, flyweights, will be staged in the coliseum here the first or second week in March. It was announced tonight by Ad Thacher, promoter. The exact time will hinge upon an open date in the coliseum's bookings, Thacher said.

OKMULGEE, Okla., Feb. 8.—The Western Baseball association, composed of teams representing Muskogee, Bartlesville, Okmulgee, McAlester, Drumwright, and Pawhuska, Okla., Fort Smith, Ark., and Springdale, Mo., was organized today. The association will play a 140 game schedule.

Wins Skate Title
MILWAUKEE, Feb. 8.—William Steinmetz, Chicago, won the western skating championship at Washington Park this afternoon with a total of 99 points. His closest competitors were E. McGowan, of St. Paul, and Roy McWhirter of Chicago, who each had 49 points.

Breaks Records
BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 8.—Enrique Tiraboschi, an Italian swimmer, broke the world's immersion record, when he swam the River Plata, crossing from Colonia, on the Uruguayan coast, from which point he started Saturday, to within five kilometers of Buenos Aires. Tiraboschi was taken aboard a motor boat in an exhausted condition at 3:50 this afternoon, after he had been in the water twenty-four hours and two minutes. The distance is about 32 miles, but the swimmer was forced to breast a strong current.

CRITICAL HOUR OF ITALIAN HISTORY

Premier Nitti Discusses Foreign Policy, Rebukes Reactionaries and Reviews Fiume Case

ROME, Saturday, Feb. 7.—Premier Nitti discussed the Italian foreign policy in the chamber of deputies today. "In the critical hour of our history," said the premier, "it is indispensable to tell the entire truth, even if we have to do so with an aching heart. Foreign policy has an influence on home policy, and home policy on foreign policy, so that the two must harmonize. My government has been accused of weakness by those desiring reaction."

"Those who were most insistent that we enter the war render now the worst possible service by saying that we obtained nothing. We must remember that all Italians who desired war asked only for Trent and Trieste. It is therefore a mistake to say that nothing was obtained, when our terms are more than satisfied."

"In other questions, where Italy is most interested, namely, the Adriatic, Constantinople, and Asia Minor, Italy must be guided by the broadest principles of nationality. The spontaneous plebiscite at Fiume, declaring a desire to join Italy, created a new political situation, which caused a series of difficulties. There can be only two solutions—either the pact of London, which we claim as our right, or the solution we invoke in the name of justice, consisting of harmonizing the interests, tendencies and aspirations of the Italian people with those of the Jugo-Slav people."

The Socialist deputy Bombacci, interrupting, asked: "Who rules in Fiume—The Italian government or d'Annunzio?" "It would be dishonest if I accepted the pact of London without pledging myself to evacuate Fiume, even with force if necessary," said the premier. Signor Nitti deplored the attacks on foreign countries and foreign rulers, especially America.

"Did the conservatives expect me to act like a Don Quixote? Did they expect me to declare war on America?" In reference to the economic situation, he said: "It is not America which refuses to lend Italy, but it is Italy which is lowering her credit that prevents America from helping us."

U. OF U. OFFERS MEDAL FOR BEST SHOWING IN HIGH SCHOOLS

Six gold medals and four silver medals for the best showing of high schools in debating, extemporaneous speaking, and reading, have been offered by the University of Utah. The state has been divided into eight districts and the winners of each district will meet at the University on High School day. Ogden high school will compete with Boxelder, Cache and Rich county schools.

The question for debate is: Resolved that the federal government should pass legislation providing for compulsory arbitration of labor disputes in all public utilities, constitutionality conceded. Some phase of the world's peace will be the subject for the speaking contest, while the reading contest will consist of a 10 minute reading from Dickens' "Christmas Carol."
