NO REDUCTION IN 1926 INCOME TAXES

Secretary Houston Says Lower Rate Would be Manifestly Unsafe

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Any reduction of income and excess profits taxes to be collected in the calendar years 1926 and 1927 would be "manifestly unsafe," Secretary Houston declared in a letter today to the house ways and means committee. Simplification of these taxes was urged, however.

Unless action is taken at the present session of congress, Mr. Houston said, these taxes "must be continued to be collected on the basis of the present law until the close of the calendar year 1927." He added that he could not "contemplate such delay without the gravest apprehension."

For the simplification of the taxes, with a resultant "modest reduction," the secretary first recommended enactment of an amendment authorizing the internal revenue bureau to make a final determination and settlement of any tax claim or assessment which shall hereafter be re-opened or modified by the government except on a showing of fraud. The particular importance of this change, the secretary said, was if the present levies continue and all back taxes along with the current taxes are collected in the same year "the result may be highly disastrous to business" in case of industrial depression.

Other recommendations included: Extension to all income and profit tax laws of the five-year clause contained only in 1913 law for bringing suits for collection of taxes.

Exemptions on the Liberty bond issues so as to strengthen the market standing of those securities.

be made now and urged substitution of a flat tax on profits in excess of the distributed earnings instead of the present levy.

It suggested that this flat rate be 25 per cent for 1923, 20 per cent for 1924, and 15 per cent for 1925, so that it would raise virtually as much as the present excess profits taxes.

The population is exclusive of persons reading at military and naval stations. The population of the Honolulu district was placed at 80,369.
