

Anderson, whose postoffice address is Ogdens, Utah, has made application in accordance with the requirements of the Compiled Laws of Utah, 1907, as amended by the Session Laws of Utah, 1909, to appropriate one (1) cubic foot per second of water from springs in Weber county, Utah. Said springs are situated at a point which lies north 40 feet and east 1,240 feet distant from the south quarter corner of Section 24, Township 6 north, Range 1 west, Salt Lake base and meridian. The water will be diverted at the place where it issues from said springs and conveyed by means of a pipe line for a distance of 2,000 feet, where it will be used during the period from April 1 to October 1, inclusive, of each year, to irrigate approximately 80 acres of land embraced in Section 2, Township 5 north, Range 1 west, Salt Lake base and meridian, for a secondary purpose, as much of said water as may be necessary will be used during the entire year for domestic purposes.
