BEING TRIED FOR GRAND LARCENY

While Judge Lewis is busy in one part of the court house attending to legal matters of the district court, Judge Howell and a jury are hearing the case of the state against Joseph Smith in another part of the court house.

The information charges Smith with grand larceny, alleging that on June 1 of this year he took from the pockets of Thomas O'Brien the sum of \$10. The robbery occurred on Twenty-fifth street, near Lester park.

Hiram Lund and Albert Folger testified that on the night in question they came upon Smith while he was in the act of rifling the pockets of O'Brien. They saw him take \$10 from the pockets of O'Brien and throw the money away when he saw them approaching.

The two young men took Smith in their care and keeping until the officers arrived and arrested him.

The case will go to the jury at an early hour this afternoon.

MRS. BAXTER ASKS FOR DIVORCE

In a petition for separate maintenance filed in the city division of the district court today, Mary Baxter alleges that her husband, William A. Baxter, committed adultery with Susanna Duffin last year and that he still keeps her company by taking her out buggy riding and other ways.

Mrs. Baxter also states that, on July 3, the defendant dragged her from the house out into the fields and left her there all night, she being compelled to sleep on the bare ground.

On July 4 the petitioner says, the defendant threatened to kill her and actually made an attempt to do so by assaulting her and bruising her about the body, and he would have accomplished his purpose had not the son, James, of the plaintiff and defendant, intervened.

The plaintiff asks that she be permitted the use of the property for the support of the children, that the defendant pay \$150 attorney fees and be restrained from using the property in question or in any way disposing of it.

She asks for such other relief as the court may deem just.

DELINQUENT TAXES IN WEBER

County Treasurer Alma D. Chambers states that during the past three days his office has been receiving less than \$300 each day, as payment of taxes. But that there were a good deal of money yet due. He is extending a few days of grace to sugar beet growers, who have not yet been paid for their crops.

All taxes became delinquent last evening, but there are a great many taxpayers at the pay-window of the treasurer's office today, making settlements.

Mr. Chambers says he cannot at the present state just how large the delinquent tax list will be this year, but he is of the opinion that it will be as large, or a little larger, than it was last year.

NEGRO WILL PLEAD HIS OWN CASE

William Brady, a colored man charged with burglary in the third degree, was arraigned in police court this morning and given instructions, relative to his legal rights, by Judge J. D. Howell. He was placed under a bond of \$500 and his preliminary hearing continued.

It is alleged in the complaint that Brady and another man by the name of Bob Oldfield, on November 11 entered the apartments of Harriet Roberts, in the Chamberlain rooming house, 155 Twenty-fifth street, and there stole a pair of diamond earrings, valued at \$250, and a postoffice money order for \$5. The theft is said to have been committed during the day time in the absence of the victim.

Brady stoutly maintains his innocence and states that his record of sixteen years residency in Ogden will prove that he is not a thief. So far he has declined to accept legal advice and says he will produce witnesses to prove that he is innocent of the crime with which he is charged.

MARCOONED IN A TERRIFIC STORM

COROVIA, Alaska, Nov. 15.—Eighty-three persons, comprising the passengers and crew of the wrecked steamer Portland, which was beached in the mouth of the Katalla river Saturday, are stranded on Katala island. The storm, which broke soon after the passengers were landed from the wrecked vessel, is raging with increased fury, and all efforts to go to the aid of the marooned passengers have proven unsuccessful.

There are few people living on the island and the food supply is small. It is feared that if the passengers and crew of the Portland are not taken to the aid of soon they will suffer great hardships owing to the failure of the food supply.

SESSION OF THE BASEBALL LEAGUES

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—Secretary J. H. Farrell of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues read his report when that organization met in annual meeting here today. Othor, the national outfit was scheduled to begin business at noon. No baseball meeting in history, however, was ever known to begin at the hour specified, and no traditions were shattered today.

The meeting was called to order by Farrell reported and adjournment was taken until tomorrow.

In his statement the secretary said: "Fifty league organizations, embracing 236 cities and towns in the United States and Canada qualified for membership.

"Eight hundred and fifty-nine players were suspended. "Two hundred and sixty-two players were reinstated.

"Number of players drafted by the National League, 77; number drafted by American League, 68; number drafted by American Association, 130.

"Total amount received through this office for drafted players and money returned on debts disallowed: "National League, \$48,000; American League, \$37,800; National Association of Baseball Leagues, \$58,700."

While the paramount question of classification was a general matter of some discussion in the crowded lobby, nothing of a definite nature transpired. It was hinted that developments might be expected at the night session of the board of arbitration. It was 9 o'clock before the board resumed its deliberations.

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
