## MORRIS KNOCKS OUT SCHRECK IN SIX ROUNDS

"Flying Dutchman" Proves Easy for the "White Hope," Who Shows Ability in Battling With Both Hands—Right Hook to the Jaw Won for Morris.

SAPULPA, Okla., March 28.—Knocking out Mike Schreck, the Cincinnati heavyweight, in six rounds here today, Carl Morris of this city kept himself in the running as the "White Man's Hope."

That was about all he did, however, for his showing was not such as he calculated to indicate that Champion Jack Johnson is in imminent danger of losing his title to the ex-engineer of Sapulpa.

A right hook in the jaw won for Morris. Morris beat Schreck fairly enough, but the fight was slow. About all Schreck did was to act as a punching bag for Morris. The records show that the "Flying Dutchman" landed in all about a half-dozen punches, none of which was hard enough to jar even a middleweight, and Morris is far larger than a middleweight, for he weighed in at 245 pounds.

Schreck was fat and slow. He took a bad beating and was bloody and pitiful when the final count came. There are those who are willing to intimate that Schreck was glad to hear the "ten" tolled off. But, if he was, he is not to be censured. One thing Morris did prove in this fight that he can battle with both hands. This is the first fight in which he has used his left to any extent. Morris is slow, he has a punch, but it will take a large amount of training to put him in a class with any of the leading boxers in the heavyweight department.

Morris left here tonight for Tulsa, where he will make his home. He is now under the management of Frank Ufer, an old man, who paid \$25,000 for the right to handle him. Fighting has not been a poor game for Morris. He stepped down from the cab of an engine last July to enter the ring. Today he stepped from the ring into a new \$6,000 automobile he has purchased with his earnings.

## MURRAY ON WITNESS STAND

The case of James F. Murray against the Utah Canning company was taken up by Judge Powell again this morning, the first witness to be called to the stand being Freeman Murray, father of the plaintiff.

Mr. Murray stated that he was familiar with the machinery of the canning factory, having worked in the factory at times during the past nine years. He said that the overhead shafting was within a few feet of the refining machine where his son was hurt, and that it was unprotected. The witness also said that, in his judgment, the machinery at the point where the accident occurred could have been placed in a safe condition for a few dollars, and that had that been done his son would not have met with the accident. On cross examination, however, Mr. Murray stated that it was not customary for "line shaftings" to be so protected.

The plaintiff was called to the witness stand shortly before the noon hour. At the time of the accident, the boy was a little under fifteen years of age, but he had been working at the factory for some time and was quite familiar with the machinery. In telling the story of the accident, he said that he had been told by Mrs. Clinton, the lady who had charge of the bottling department, which was on the floor where the accident occurred, to clean the "refiner" in place the cover over it. He climbed the ladder to the point where he could reach the machinery and proceeded to do the work assigned him. He was in the act of replacing the cover on the "refiner" when his coat was caught by the union on the revolving shaft and his body was carried with great velocity around the shaft. He said his left arm and leg were broken and that he was otherwise badly bruised and lacerated. The injuries to his left leg and feet were such that part of the leg had to be amputated.

## PRISONERS BEFORE THE COURT

Judge Hulaniski's first official act as district attorney was performed this morning when he appeared for the state in the criminal prosecution of James Jordan, charged with burglary in the second degree.

The prisoner was arraigned and the information of Attorney Hulaniski, charging him with burglary, was read to him by the clerk. Jordan stated to the court that he desired an attorney to represent him, but that he did not have the means with which to employ one, whereupon the court appointed D. A. Skeen to act, and the time for hearing the plea was set for Thursday morning.

Harry Ross, represented by an attorney, and charged with forgery, was also in court for arraignment. It was stated by the court that, although the defendant had previously been arraigned and had entered a plea to the information against him, yet the record did not show that fact. The attorney for Ross stated that the previous arraignment might be read into the record, and the attorney stated, that he would be ready to take up

the case for trial next week. Ross pleaded not guilty.

The defendant's career in Ogden during the past year or more has been rather spectacular, not many months ago he having been arrested and placed under a bond to keep the peace. It was charged by a young man of this city that, because he ventured to keep company with a young lady whom Ross claimed to be his sweetheart, that Ross threatened to kill him. Ross said he did not intend to carry out such threat, but he was required to go to jail for some time upon his failure to furnish a peace bond.

Shortly after the love affair, Ross went to Idaho and, upon his return to Ogden, Idaho officers had him arrested on the charge of forgery. In this instance Ross explained to the satisfaction of his friends that he was entirely innocent of wrong doing and that he had simply endorsed a paper calling for the payment of money. Ross was again liberated from jail.

The last offense with which he has been charged is the forgery of the firm name of H. Bateman & Company to a check for \$9.75. It is related that the check was cashed at the Baron clothing store on Washington avenue. The proprietor gave a clear description of the man. For some time the officers searched for Ross, but he succeeded in eluding them. A few weeks ago as Mr. Barron was on his way home, he came across Ross and immediately recognized him. He took Ross into custody and advised the police officers of the arrest. One of the officers was dispatched to bring Ross to the station. While on the way to the station, however, Ross made a desperate bolt for liberty and succeeded in getting away from the officer, but he was afterwards arrested and landed in jail.
