## BUILDING ON THE INCREASE

Business Blocks and New Homes Continue to be Constructed and More Structures Are Planned—Brick Laying on the New Theater on Twenty-fifth Street—New Office Buildings.

Notwithstanding the somewhat lethargic condition of building operations in other cities of the state, Ogden keeps well along in the erection of buildings and in making other improvements of a substantial nature. There are many residences going up in the city, and business houses that have been commenced are being pushed to completion.

Brick laying has begun on the new theater building on Twenty-fifth street, between Grant and Lincoln avenues. The basement is finished and there will be no necessity for delay in the brick laying.

The large concrete floor for the basement of the Commercial National bank building on Grant avenue, between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets, has been completed and the plasterers and lathmen are busy making the partitions on the upper floors. Painters have also begun their operations, and the floors on the second and third stories will be placed by carpenters within the next few days. President Heywood of the bank states that he expects the building to be ready for use in the early part of June.

The Howell building on Hudson avenue, between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets, is being plastered and the parties who have leased the place expect to enter the building about June 1.

Preparations for the building of the brick walls on the foundation of the Hurst investment business block on the same avenue are being made. A. V. McIntosh has begun the erection of a fine residence on Twenty-fifth street, between Harrison and Van Buren avenues, that will cost something over \$4,500.

C. J. A. Lindquist has commenced the erection of an addition to his undertaking parlors on Washington avenue, between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-seventh streets, that will cost over \$1,400.

William Fisher is spending \$500 in the building of an addition to his business block on Twenty-fifth street, between Grant and Lincoln avenues.

Mrs. S. Tracy is building a home

on Hudson avenue, between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-seventh streets, that will cost \$1,500.

On Twenty-seventh street, between Monroe and Quincy avenues, George Eddulph is putting up a \$500 addition to his residence.

Walter Irwin is erecting a dwelling house on Williams avenue, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth streets, that will cost \$1,600.

Charles Ford is building an addition to his studio on Twenty-fourth street, between Washington and Adams avenues. The cost will be about \$600.

G. L. Becker has begun the building of a residence on Lincoln avenue, between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets. It will cost upwards of \$1,600.

Dr. E. C. Rich is building a modern office at his home on Washington avenue, between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-seventh streets, that will cost \$2,000.

## GATE CITY WANTS NEXT CONVENTION

In a letter to Secretary N. A. Gay of the Ogden council of the United Commercial Travelers' association, J. H. Young, secretary of the Pocatello body, states that his city will make an effort to land the 1912 convention when the United Travelers convene in Ogden next month.

The letter states that at recent meetings of Gate City council No. 239, U. C. T. A., Pocatello Commercial club and Pocatello city council, it was agreed that the Gate City should make an effort to secure next year's meeting, and each of the three bodies mentioned will unite to that end.

Mr. Young has been appointed chairman of a committee representing the Commercial club, which is to attend the convention in the interest of Pocatello for the 1912 convention. He has

been instructed to tell the various councils represented in the grand council that Pocatello is ready to give them the best she has. Secretary Gay states that arrangements for the convention are progressing nicely. He has received a letter from Butte, stating that the council from that city is coming to Ogden on a special train. The number of visitors from the Montana city is not yet definitely known.

## FRUIT INSPECTOR ISSUES WARNING

R. N. Rasmussen, horticultural inspector for Weber county, has issued the following notice to apple growers: "Apple growers get busy at once. The time for calyx spraying is limited, as the calyx cups are closing up very fast; in fact, some varieties are already closed. It is necessary to spray and spray thoroughly in controlling the codling moth. Formula is arsenate of lead, 6 pounds to 120 gallons of water. Would advise growers spraying their peaches and apricots for the twig borer with the same solution."
