DECORATING FOR NEXT WEEK

Hotels and rooming houses all over the city are making ready for the Commercial Travelers' convention, and it is stated by the proprietors of those places that there is no question but that there will be ample sleeping accommodations for all the visitors within the gates of the city next week.

Decorations, in the shape of U. C. T. flags and banners on buildings are in evidence today and the committee on decorations state that they are going to urge that business houses begin decorating in earnest today, so that the city will be embellished with flags, banners, bunting and all things necessary to make it look like a convention city for the commercial men of the Intermountain country. An additional prize has been offered by the committee on decorations, \$50 for the best decorated business building, \$25 for the best, \$15 for the second best and \$10 for the third.

The prizes now offered are: \$100 for three best Weber county hotels; \$50 first, \$30 second and \$20 third. \$50 for three best floats; \$25 first, \$15 second, and \$10 third. \$50 for three best decorated windows; \$25 first, \$15 second, \$10 third. \$50 for three best decorated business houses; \$25 first, \$15 second, \$10 third.

The committee states that final arrangements are now being made and that everything will be ready for the travelers upon their arrival here. Grand Counsellor H. K. Fritchman will arrive in Ogden, Saturday, to remain here until after the convention. Mr. Fritchman is the mayor of Boise, the big city of Idaho.

TROOPS ARE RECALLED

Taft Has Confidence in Stability of New Government

Washington, June 7.—As evidence of the President's belief that peace has been restored in Mexico, with a stable government capable of coping with the situation, the withdrawal by degrees of the armed forces of the United States from the doors of Mexico began today.

The first orders refer to the 200 marines, at Guantanamo, Cuba, who will return to their home stations and ships. This will be followed shortly by the northward movement of the soldiers comprising the provisional brigades at Galveston, Texas, and San Diego, Cal. From San Diego most of the soldiers will go to San Francisco and Monterey.

Even the maneuver division at San Antonio will be split up into several units and distributed throughout Texas. As a matter of precaution, however, the division will be raised so that it can be quickly assembled to meet any emergency. The warships which have rendezvoused at Guantanamo and San Diego since last March, will not be withdrawn at this time, although even that question is under consideration.

SHARP CLASH OVER TARIFF

Democratic and Republican Leaders Say Mean Things

Washington, June 7.—General debate on the Underwood wool bill was scheduled to begin in the House today.

That the Republican minority is to make a vigorous assault on the bill which reduces the duties on wool and woolen goods more than one-half, was signalled in the minority report of the ways and means committee, signed by Representatives Payne, Daisell, Needham and Longworth.

The debate opened with a clash between Democratic Leader Underwood, author of the revised schedule "K" and Representative Seno E. Payne of New York, in charge of the Republican opposition.

Mr. Payne denied statements by Mr. Underwood that the treasury was in a "depleting condition" because of the failure of the Payne-Aldrich law to produce sufficient revenue. Mr. Payne also denied that the act referred to had proved an upward instead of a downward revision.

"Oh, well, the country decided that," said Mr. Underwood.

The country's information from just such false statements as this from the Democratic side of the House," retorted Mr. Payne.

RAYNER ROASTS THEO. ROOSEVELT

Washington, June 7.—In presenting to the senate his final plea in support of the election of senator by the direct vote of the people, Senator Rayner of Maryland today once more paid his respects to former President Roosevelt. He said the former president had the "peculiar faculty" of getting on and off platforms "with alacrity."
