must have been fired at a distance of at least six feet. When the condition of Austin became critical Friday and he was sent to St. Mark's hospital for an operation, Mrs. Austin appeared before Chief of Police S. M. Barlow and presented the statement of her husband. This statement is as follows:

"I, George H. Austin, wish to make this statement exonerating my wife, Edith G. Austin, from the blame of having inflicted the gunshot wounds on my person in the early morning of July 25, said wounds having been willfully inflicted by myself, and not accidental as heretofore claimed by me."

"Witnesses: "MRS. OTTO THOMPSON, "MRS. ED. FOIBERT, "MRS. MYRTLE JONES." Chief Barlow said yesterday that while the statement tended to exonerate Mrs. Austin the case would be thoroughly investigated in case of the death of Austin.

Other peculiar circumstances in connection with the shooting began to develop last night when it was learned that Mrs. Austin had moved her husband to the Galena block, Second South and State streets, as his condition became serious, but had only remained with him three days. She engaged Dr. I. W. Waite, who has offices in the Galena block, to attend him. Occasionally she visited her husband, frequently inquiring of Dr. Waite if his condition were really serious. When it did become serious Friday morning, Dr. Waite insisted upon sending Austin to a hospital where he could be given efficient surgical attention immediately after Austin had been taken to the hospital. Mrs. Austin paid a brief visit to the bedside of her dying husband at St. Mark's hospital shortly after 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Then she went to the home of Mrs. Otto Thompson, 25 South Fifth East street, owner of the apartment where Mr. and Mrs. Austin lived at the time of the shooting. She informed Mrs. Thompson that her husband was doing as well as possible. She would not tell Mrs. Thompson where she lived at the hospital as she asked attendants to send a messenger for her at 1117 East First South street in the event that anything unlooked for should happen to her husband. This address embraces a vacant lot and residents in that vicinity do not know Mrs. Austin. Efforts to locate her last evening failed.

four years for second degree burglary, received one of these. He was sentenced from the Third district court November 7, 1909. George E. Robert E. Burrs sought commutation of sentence, but was denied. He is serving two years for second degree burglary. Peter Affleck, serving for the same charge, was told to present his petition three months hence. William Tugwell, serving one year for third degree burglary, was denied an application for pardon. The petition of Edward Kirk, serving seven years for grand larceny, was referred to the next meeting. He was convicted August 13, 1910, in the Second district court.

NEW UTAH ROAD WILL BE RUSHED

SALT LAKE, Aug. 20.—It is said that construction work will be rushed on the new railroad in Southern Utah to connect the Salt Lake route with the Grand Canyon and thus give the Santa Fe competition for the tourist business to this famous spot in Arizona, now reached exclusively by the Santa Fe.

The road will pass through St. George and Iron counties, through Dixieland, the famed fruit and cotton region of southern Utah, at present without a railroad. The proposed line will connect with the Salt Lake route at Lund and pass through St. George the county seat of Washington county.
