CHILDREN OF STRIKERS RATHER ON ROOSEVELT

Investigation in Lawrence Is Started by the Government
Maryland Senator Fears For the Country, If Roosevelt Is Elected

Boston, Feb. 27.—The federal government is to investigate the action of the municipal authorities at Lawrence in preventing the exportation of strikers' children from the city. United States District Attorney French announced today that Attorney General Wickersham has ordered him to determine whether the municipal authorities of Lawrence had violated the interstate commerce act by preventing the railroad from carrying out its contract with those who had arranged to send children out of the state.

Washington, Feb. 27.—Reversal of judicial decisions by popular vote, as proposed by ex-President Roosevelt in his Columbus address last week, was denounced in the senate today by Senator Rayner of Maryland as "the most dangerous doctrine ever brought forward by any one who has the slightest regard for the stability of our institutions and whose opinion is entitled to any weight or respect."

ENGINEER INVESTIGATES.

Provo, Feb. 27.—Supervising Engineer Louis C. Hill of the United States reclamation service arrived last evening and will remain here a few days to go over the work of the Strawberry project and prepare a report for the government. Project Engineer J. L. Lytel reported yesterday that the work is progressing very nicely at the tunnel. He said eighteen inches of snow fell in the Strawberry valley and around the project last week, which will help water conditions materially, although much snow is still needed to give the project a normal supply of water.

INTERVENTION IN TURCO-ITALIAN WAR

Paris, Feb. 27.—Confirmation of the reports that the powers are mediating intervention with the object of bringing the Turco-Italian war to an end, is given in a semi-official note published here today. France, according to this note, is ready to associate herself in any collective action by the powers in bringing about peace.

NO STRIKE IN ENGLAND

London, Feb. 27.—An early settlement of the dispute in the coal trade, which has threatened to throw nearly a million miners out of employment on March 1, apparently is more than probable, although it cannot yet be definitely announced.

GIRL FALLS UNCONSCIOUS; MAN HELD BY POLICE

Salt Lake, Feb. 27.—Katherine Fisher, 17 years old, of 917 South Third West street, employed in the culinary department of the Hotel Utah, stumbled into her home exhausted yesterday noon and fell unconscious. She had been missing since Saturday afternoon. Up to a late hour last night she had not recovered sufficiently to account for her condition or where she had been. Following an investigation by the police, Frank Uccia, 24 years old, wine steward at the Hotel Utah, was arrested by Patrolman Henry Foster. Pending developments of the condition of Miss Fisher, he will be held in the city prison on an open charge, declares the police. He admits that he took Miss Fisher to an entertainment Saturday evening, but says that the young woman went home at 11 o'clock.

AMERICAN OLYMPIC TEAM.

New York, Feb. 27.—It has now been definitely decided that the American Olympic team will sail from here on June 14. Their host, the Finland, will call at Antwerp on June 25 for a stay of two days and will arrive at Stockholm on June 28, the day the stadium will be officially opened. The athletic events will begin July 6. The committee plans to take 100 athletes and 250 additional passengers.
