"The diamond is pretty heavy on account of the recent rains upon the newly plowed and harrowed ground," remarked the manager, "but if the outlook is half good we will play ball."


Says the Butte Inter-Mountain: It does not seem as if the organization for advertising Ogden was ordered turned into the treasury of the Weber club publicity bureau.
