DRIVING THE GOLDEN SPIKE

Pioche, Nev., July 1.—The golden spike was driven at noon yesterday in the Prince Consolidated railroad. The ceremony was attended by a large number of prominent mining men of Utah and Nevada.

George F. Wasson of the Salt Lake Stock and Mining exchange delivered the principal address. Mr. Wasson related briefly the history of Pioche, its name and fame in the mining world, and paid a glowing tribute to the men who have been behind the gigantic undertakings that have resulted in a great revival for Pioche.

"A railroad to tap these properties was conclusively shown to be a necessity. The Godbe boys and their supporters rose to the occasion; they realized that there were millions of tons of ore in sight, that only a fraction of what exists had been developed."

"The time has arrived to drive the last spike. Drive it home and drive it true."

"Good luck to the Godbes, good luck to the Prince Consolidated railroad, good luck to every man, woman and child in or interested in the camp—good luck to Pioche. May she rise strengthened from the slumber of the years and come forth vigorous with renewed youth to take her place among the great mining camps of the world."

Last evening there was a big banquet, at which Mr. Johnson of the International Smelting & Refining company made the principal speech.

The Salt Lake delegation will leave here today, arriving at home early Tuesday morning.
