CONCESSIONS TO LIGHT COMPANY

Representatives of the Merchants' Light and Power company of Ogden met yesterday with the Salt Lake city commissioners to determine upon the rate of license tax which the concern is to pay Salt Lake City in consideration of the franchise recently granted it for furnishing electric light and power to Salt Lake consumers. Modification was made of the provision requiring the payment of percentages on the gross income of the company. Objection was made by the promoters of the company to the payment of what they considered an excessive per cent in view of the fact that they had such keen competition in the city, and especially since the franchise granted the competing company was so much more liberal in its provisions. Agreement was reached that the company should pay nothing for the first five years, one half of 1 per cent for the next twenty years and 1 per cent for the last twenty-five years. The former provision required the payment of one half of 1 per cent for the first five years, 1-1/2 per cent for the next twenty years and 2 per cent for the last twenty-five years. The income tax will be paid, however, on the lighting system only. No revenue will be collected by the city on the gross income obtained from the sale of power. It was explained by the representatives of the company that the competition was so keen on power that they could not hope to exist in the field had they to pay an income tax to the city. The commissioners also promised the representatives of the company that the lighting contract for Salt Lake City lights would be advertised, and that it would be awarded to the lowest bidder. The promise was secured on the representation that the new concern wishes to prepare its plans to compete with the Utah Light and Railway company, which now furnishes the lights.

RESTAURANT RAIDED BY POLICE

Chief of Police W. I. Norton and a force of detectives and patrolmen raided a Greek restaurant conducted by Harry Gavros at 112 Twenty-fifth street, last night, and seized a stock of liquors valued at \$1,500. The liquor was concealed in the basement of the establishment and included three barrels of bottled beer, fifteen barrels of wine and whiskey, one keg of draft beer and three and one-half cases of brandy. Gavros is the man who was arrested last week for selling liquor without a license, the arrest being made by two detectives who caught him in the act of supplying two customers with beer. For this offense Gavros deposited \$500 bail and the same was later forfeited on his non-appearance in court. Gavros formerly conducted a saloon but lost his license through the new ruling of the courts and has since been running a rooming house and restaurant. The liquor which was seized yesterday is now stored in the city building, awaiting action on the part of the owner. If he does not appear within fifteen days and prove his innocence of violating the new law by having the liquor in his possession, the stock will be pronounced confiscated and will be destroyed.

DEMOCRATIC CLUB IN WEBER

A Wilson-Marshall Democratic club for Weber county was organized yesterday evening at the county court house, 30 prominent Democrats signing the lists as charter members and contributing to a campaign fund. Officers were elected and a revised constitution was unanimously adopted by those present. It was decided that the county at large will receive recognition with the city, the 22 outlying districts to be allowed the same representation as is allowed the 17 city districts. FOUND GUILTY OF DYNAMITING

John and Bert Baum of Heber, Utah, were found guilty yesterday of dynamiting fish, according to Fish and Game Commissioner Fred Chambers, who attended the trial in the Wasatch county court. The young men will be sentenced to jail Aug. 12. As dynamiting fish is a serious offense there is considerable speculation as to how long the prisoners will have to serve. The law fixes the maximum sentence at five years and does not provide an alternative fine. There is no minimum sentence mentioned in the statutes, the matter being left to the judge. Chambers states that he is determined to carry game and fish prosecutions to the limit. 
