Mrs. J. WILL KILL SUGAR BILL

The Democrats in House Serve Notice of Intended Slaughter

Washington, Aug. 8.—House conferees on the sugar tariff bill have served notice to the senate conferees that they will not accept the Bristol Lodge sugar bill passed by the senate. "The measure is not a Democratic bill," said Representative Underwood today, "and does not meet the ideas of the house as to what a general revision of the sugar tariff should be."

It became apparent there was little chance of an agreement upon a compromise measure; and that efforts to bring about an agreement on the excise tax bill in line with the present plans of the Democratic-Progressive alliance in the senate might prove ineffective.

CARNEGIE FAVORS AN INCOME TAX

New York, Aug. 8.—That Andrew Carnegie is a firm believer in an graduated income tax is shown in a passage of a speech made by him this week at Montrose, England. A cabled extract of the speech says in part: "In one department the motherland is ahead of the dominions and the United States. She has established the law, first proclaimed by Adam Smith, that every subject should contribute to the support of the government in proportion to the income he enjoys under the present constitution of the state."

"The just taxation of the millionaires of the dominion and the United States has so far escaped but their day is coming. The boards of millionaires should be no treated, not as a punishment, but for their good, because it is just and justice alone insures general contentment."

SHOOTS HIS WIFE AND TAKES POISON

Denver, Colo., Aug. 8.—After shooting his wife twice in the back, inflicting fatal wounds, Henry Robitill early today turned his weapon upon the employes and patrons of a restaurant in which the shooting occurred. The shots went wild.

Three hours later Robitill walked into a saloon twenty blocks from the scene of the shooting.

"Throw up your hands, d— you," he commanded. "I've only got this night to live. Give me all the cash in that drawer."

Robitill made no move to take the money. Instead he forced the bartender to give him several drinks. In an moment of relaxed vigilance, the man was overpowered. At the city jail Robitill became unconscious and was rushed to the county hospital, where it is reported he is suffering from poison, presumably taken while drinking at the saloon.

Robitill went to the restaurant, on Larimer street, where his wife was employed, and demanded \$5. When the woman refused to give it to him, he opened fire upon her.

NEW REVOLUTION IN WEST INDIES

Washington, Aug. 8.—Dajabon, San Domingo, has been captured by rebels from Haiti territory, according to state department advices from Port au Prince. The fight which resulted in the capture lasted fourteen hours. The wounded numbered two hundred.

The rebels, it is said, crossed from Quanaonthe, Haiti.

The Dominican government claims the defeat of the rebels there with great losses. Rights of foreigners and Nationals are being respected and the customs house is undisturbed. The United States gunboat Petrel is at Puerto Plata.
