

## JUDGE JOHNSON ESCAPES CENSURE

The Republican state committee at a meeting at Republican state headquarters in the Felt building in Salt Lake yesterday decided that it did not have the power to review the action of the state convention in the nomination of Judge Johnson to congress. The committee had under consideration a communication declaring that the nomination had been obtained by fraud and that charges against Judge Johnson's personal character disqualified him from being an acceptable candidate for the election.

Judge Johnson appeared before the committee prepared, he declared, to disprove all the charges brought against him. Persons who had known Judge Johnson for forty years were ready to state that the charges against his character were groundless. They said the charges were made more than thirty years old and that during the entire time that they had known Judge Johnson they had known of no grounds upon which to base such accusation. They called attention to the fact that he had lived in the same community for the last forty years and had been honored by the people of the community with election to the district bench and had been given other positions of trust which he had filled ably and honorably. Furthermore, as evidence that the friends and neighbors of Judge Johnson take no stock in the charges brought against him it is asserted that he will receive the support of a large majority of the people of his home county for congress, irrespective of their political preferences.

**Found Vindication.**  
The state committee yesterday sent the following communication to those who were requesting that an investigation into the charges against Judge Johnson be made by the committee:

Gentlemen: Referring to your communications in regard to nomination of Judge Johnson for congress, would say Judge Johnson was regularly nominated by the Republican convention. That convention was the sole judge of the qualifications of its candidates and the state committee has no authority to review the action of the Republican state convention.

Judge Johnson last night declined to comment on the action of the state committee. He said that the action had evidently ended the controversy.

Joseph Bellenger was Judge Johnson's leading opponent for the congressional nomination, and who charges that the nomination of Johnson was secured by fraud, said last night that he had received no notification of a meeting of the Republican committee and had been given no opportunity to present any evidence to the committee bearing on the question. He said that he had not made any plans as to what action he would take relative to the matter in this contingency as he had been firmly convinced that the committee would grant him a hearing. However, he declared that he purposed getting the facts before the public if it was necessary for him to hire halls in every part of the state. He said he would not let the matter rest with the action of the state committee. It is possible that Mr. Joseph may attempt by court procedure to keep Mr. Johnson's name off the ballot.

### Chicago Grain

Chicago, Oct. 2.—Rumors that the Bulgarian army had crossed the Turkish frontier caused the wheat market today to advance. There were reports from Liverpool that the continent was bidding freely for cargoes on passage. Offers here were light and buying general on the part of shorts. The opening was 1-8-11/16 to 3-8-11/16. December started at 90 7/8 to 91 1/8, a gain of 1-4 to 3-8-11/16, touched 90 3/4 to 78c and rose to 91 1/4.  
Corn showed firmness with wheat and in consequence of higher cables. December opened 1-5-11/16 to 1-5-11/16, 3-8c up at 52 5/8 to 52 3/4 and steadied at 52 1/2-5/8.  
In oats, scantiness of the pit supply had a bullish effect. December started 1-8c to 1-4c higher at 31 7/8 to 32c and held around 31 3/4-7/8.  
An upturn for provisions resulted from an advance in hog prices and owing to a big decrease in the stock of packinghouse products here. First sales were 2 1/2 to 10c higher with January \$18.50 to \$18.55 for pork, 10.65 to 10.67 1/2 for lard and 90.00 to 99.92 1/2 to 99.95 for ribs.

### New York Stocks

New York, Oct. 2.—The foreign situation was again responsible for the heaviness shown by today's early market. Opening prices were a reflection of extensive selling by London, not only for its own account, but for other centers as well. Large amounts of steel and other active issues were unloaded, most of these recording initial losses of point or more, while the coal stocks and the more obscure shares lost as much. There was general recovery under the lead of St. Paul before the end of the active first hour, after which trading became quiet. Towards noon, however, activity revived with a strong undertone throughout the lists. Money opened at 6 per cent.  
Bonds were irregular.  
The market closed heavy. There was a slight hardening of prices in the last hour, but the tone continued feverish on reduced operations. Missouri Pacific was notably firm.
