Yesterday afternoon in the district court Attorney A. G. Horn of this city and the law firm of Powers & Martineaux of Salt Lake filed four separate suits against the Zion's Co-operative Home Building and Real Estate company of Salt Lake to recover an amount aggregating \$17,195 alleged to be due for the fraudulent sale of certain stock of the company.

The allegations are that the defendant company is incorporated for \$250,000 and that the stock is divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each.

Beginning in the year 1908 representatives of the company approached the defendants and sold them their stock in the company, telling them that the company was in good financial condition and that all the debts had been paid, stating further that dividends would be realized on the investments and that the money thus realized might be turned to their credit for stock.

It is said in the complaints that so-called dividends were declared on the stock for the purpose of inducing the plaintiffs to purchase more stock, but that the transactions were fraudulent and intended to defraud the defendants out of their money. It is contended that the company was not in the financial condition represented and that the stock was not worth the money paid for it.

The amounts sued for are as follows: A. H. Campbell, \$4,200; P. B. Haslet, 2,000; Fred King, \$8,170; George King, \$2,725.
