RAILROAD HAS A BOOST FOR OGDEN

The Western Pacific in its last folder has a write-up of Ogden in which the following statistics are presented: Ogden City, in Weber county, lies at the base of the rugged Wasatch mountains, overlooking Great Salt Lake, which is about twelve miles distant. The climate is delightful, there being four well defined seasons, so tempered by lake and mountain breezes that there is no extreme cold in winter or extreme heat in summer.

NEVADA HAS A MINING RUSH

Excitement over the newest strike in Nevada, at Rochester, twenty miles southeast from Lovelock, details of which appeared for the first time in this city in these columns last Saturday, is spreading to Utah, and already a number of Salt Lake men have gone out, while others are preparing to go. MAGGIE JONES FACES GRAND LARCENY

District Attorney E. T. Hulaniski today filed an information against Maggie Jones, charging her with grand larceny. Maggie is a colored woman held in the county jail. The information alleges that the defendant, on November 4, stole from one Joe Bostum \$445.

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Ogden is the natural railway center of the intermountain country. It is the center of the live stock industry, which is helped out by a first-class packing plant and is also the center of the most extensive and richest farming and fruit raising section of the state. Ogden citizens not only own the best sugar factory of their city, but most of those of the other intermountain states.

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A genuine mining boom is on in Rochester canyon, resting as it does on the edge of American canyon, from which over \$20,000,000 in placer gold was extracted in early days. Other producers surrounding it are the Spring Valleys placers with an \$8,000,000 record, and Dry Gulch canyon, with \$2,000,000 recorded shipments, also quartz producers of recorded production, such as the Arizona mine, with \$10,000,000; the old Shiba mine, credited with \$2,000,000; the Rye Patch mine, with \$17,000,000, in which the Borland stope produced \$7,000,000 of 93 per cent silver; the Humboldt Queen, with \$200,000 as a credit mark; the Relief mine, noted for its rich silver ore and \$2,000,000 in high grade

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
