## Why Electric Bills Are So Large In Winter

There are very few persons using electric illumination who realize why their bills are out of all proportion as compared with the summer bills. In the table given below we will assume that 6.30 in the morning throughout the year is the average time of rising. In summer the retiring hour is 10:30, and in winter 9 o'clock. In May, June and July from dusk until 10:30 there are only 187 hours, and during the months of these three months arising at 6:30 there will be no light used at all. During November, December and January, from dusk until 9 p. m., there are 483 hours of light required for the evenings alone, and during the mornings of November, December and January, if only one hour is used each day there will be 90 hours more to be added to 483, making 573 hours actually required, as against only 187 for summer, which makes the winter consumption of light over three times as large as for summer.

## CARLIN HAS A WILD TIME

SHEEPHERDER DRANK SOME BAD NEVADA WHISKEY.

Then Started Out to Shoot Up the Town—Narrowly Escaped Lynching—Offender in Jail.

Passengers on Southern Pacific trains from the west state that the people of Carlin are just recovering from the effects and excitement incident to an effort on the part of a wild and woolly sheepherder to run the Nevada town.

While under the influence of Carlin whiskey the sheepherder announced his purpose of shooting up the town, and without unnecessary delay inaugurated a program of bombardment that paralyzed the community. After a time the constable emerged from a vault and, slipping up behind the desperado, shoved a gun in his face and made the sheepman a prisoner. Excitement subsided, the throng dispersed and the constable started to jail with his man. En route there, the sheepherder knocked the officer down and skipped in the darkness. The officer pulled his gun, fired in the air, and the mob reassembled with the purpose of lynching the supposed murderer of the constable.

Mexican Government Gives Twenty-Year Concession, Officers Elected.

El Paso, Texas, Feb. 11.—The Mexico thoroughbred racing circuit was formally organized today, with Alberto Terrazas, president; J. G. Follansbie, vice president; Almeron Dangerfield, treasurer; Lyman H. Davis, Secretary and handicapper, and Colonel M. J. Winn, general manager. W. H. Kraft was elected one of the directors. Terrazas is a son-in-law of Governor Enrique Creel.

J. G. Follansbie, the vice president, has long been actively associated with racing in the United States, and Matt J. Winn, who will be general manager of the proposed courses, is the president of the Louisville Jockey club of Louisville, Ky.

Points in the circuit are Mexico City, Guadalupe, Monterey and Juarez. Work of building the track at Juarez will be commenced at once and the course will be ready in November. The construction of the other courses will be commenced shortly, so that by fall they should all be ready for racing.

The Mexican government has given a twenty year concession for the racing circuit. Paris Mutuals will be in operation as well as the regular form of bookmaking.

Secretary Davis will make up the program during the summer. Messrs. Terrazas, Follansbie, Winn and Kraft will complete details of the plans while here. Mr. Davis has gone to his home in Kentucky, and Almeron Dangerfield has returned to his duties as secretary of the Jockey club in New York.

Colonel Winn said tonight that about \$300,000 would be spent in the Juarez plant and about the same amount in the other proposed plants. He chose Juarez for the Mexican circuit because it is opposite El Paso and easy of access to Americans.
