Gang of Ex-Convicts.—Chief Browning stated, this afternoon, that further confessions had been partially obtained from the six alleged crooks who were captured Wednesday and that the police were already in possession of enough knowledge of the men to pronounce them members of a thoroughly organized gang of crooks who have been operating between San Francisco and New York for several years. One of the men has served ten years in San Quentin prison, California, and the others have done time at Sing Sing in New York. Four of the men are acknowledged ex-convicts, while the other two are little better. Their depredations in Nevada will be the most serious charges to be made against them, and the authorities there have been requested to come to Ogden at once to identify the men and take back those whom they want for crimes in that state. Almost all of the plunder secured in the burglary of the Upp jewelry store Tuesday night has been recovered, much of it having been found upon the persons of the men when they were arrested, and the balance having been discovered at various pawn shops about town. A watch, which has been identified as the property of a freeman at Montello, was found upon one of the men, as well as other articles of more or less value, evidently stolen property.

KICKING OUT NON-UNION MEN

"SCABS" RELEASED FROM RIO GRANDE TOLD TO GO.

Rough Experience of One or More of the Strangers in the Local Harriman Shops.

The adjustment of the trouble between the Rio Grande management and the union employees of the various shops on the system, and the return of the union men to work all along the line, has resulted in a small army of "scabs" being dismissed and scattered throughout the west. Some of them have invaded shops along the Harriman system and, under assumed names, in order to conceal their records, have applied for and secured work where "open" shops are tolerated.

It is understood that one or two of the itinerant opponents of organized labor recently succeeded in securing employment at Ogden, but their reception from local mechanics was of so cool—or rather warm—a nature that they tarried not in going—and escaped in leaps and bounds—and without even waiting to say adieu to the foreman whom they had induced to give them work.

Everything is working harmoniously and pleasantly in the Harriman shops at present, and it is not believed that the responsible heads of the great system will countenance or tolerate any unharmonious sentiment in dealing with the unions.
