COMMISSION ASKS FOR \$5,000

The regular weekly meeting of the city council was held last evening and the usual amount of routine business attended to.

The principal topic for discussion was the petition of the park commission asking for the appropriation of \$5,000 for use in the improvement and maintenance of city parks during the coming season.

The commission stated that at present figures, \$4,235 of the money now on hand would be necessary for the actual expense of maintenance and asked for at least \$5,000 additional appropriation for the purpose of making improvements, necessary improvements to the amount of \$4,100 being already under consideration.

Upon motion of Councilman Peery the matter was referred to the public Buildings and Grounds committee.

The report of the street committee and city engineer in regard to the opening of Seventeenth street south was not granted on the grounds that but few persons would be benefited by it.

The petition of several property owners in the neighborhood of lower Thirty-third street recommending that a Thirty-third street bridge be built across the Weber river, was not accepted on the grounds that the structure would not be of enough general benefit to residents of Ogden and vicinity to warrant its construction.

The report of the street committee and city engineer recommending that the new railroad viaduct be formally accepted by the city, as the structure had been built according to contract and specifications, was accepted.

The public buildings and grounds committee recommended that the board of education be allowed quarters in the city hall, and that whatever changes are necessary to be made in regard to offices be made under the direction of the committee and the city engineer. The recommendation was accepted and the city recorder was instructed to notify those whom the changes would affect.

The city recorder sent a communication to the council stating that there had as yet been no protest to the proposed paving of Twenty-fourth street between Lincoln and Wall or Wash. Ave. between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-eighth streets filed, and the matter was referred to the city engineer with instructions to prepare plans and specifications for the paving of this district, to be brought before the council for approval.

The recorder reported that there had been several protests filed against the creation of sidewalk districts on Washington avenue between Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth streets in the vicinity of Pinecock's Lane. The matter was referred to the city engineer with instructions to figure up a percentage and report at the next meeting.

A communication was presented to the effect that there had been no protests filed against the creation of a sidewalk district on Royal avenue, between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, and the property owners of that district were given thirty days in which to complete the building of their walks.

A motion was presented by Councilman Flygare that Jefferson avenue between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets be graded and put in first class condition. The motion was accepted and referred to the street committee.

Regular city pay rolls to the amount of \$2,771.25 and waterworks department pay rolls to the amount of \$412.25 were allowed. A special waterworks department pay roll amounting to \$244.40 and claims of the waterworks department amounting to \$941.13 were also allowed.

A petition from the Salt Lake Valley Canning Co., and others, on Second street asking for an extension of the water mains in that vicinity was referred to the special water commission.
