### FOUR WOMEN HAD A LONG TRAMP

**BECAME BEWILDERED IN THE MOUNTAINS EAST OF OGDEN**

Wore the Soles Off Their Shoes and Arrived Home Late in the Evening.

Four married ladies, three of whom are the wives of prominent local railroad officials, left yesterday morning for a pedestrian trip through Waterfall Canyon. Each was provided with a canehatchet, automatic gun and a lunch, and the purpose of the expedition was to explore the canyon, slaughter all game found, invade Malan's Heights and return home by way of Taylor's canyon. An early start was made and the trip was a decided and glorious success, until the invading army was assailed by a battalion of rattlesnakes. The ladies held a council of war and then attacked the enemy with hatchets and guns, scoring a victory and slaughtering the reptiles. With victory perched on their banner, the ladies resumed their march until the tracks of an enormous bear were discovered and then trouble and apprehension followed on every side. The ladies took to the brush in nervous fright and they feared to either proceed on the trip or retreat. All of them expressed an affectionate desire to greet their husbands at this time and were unanimous in declaring they would never leave home again unless their lords and masters accompanied them on their explorations. Finally the quartette reached Malan Heights, dissected their commissary departments and then hiked down Taylor's canyon and arrived home at 8 o'clock last night footsore and weary and thoroughly disgusted with their long tramp and efforts at mountain exploration. ### JOSEPH BAILEY HAS BIG FORCE ON SEVENTEENTH STREET.

Road to Fair Grounds Being Double Tracked and Electric Light and Telephone Poles Being Moved

Great progress is being made by the street railway company in double tracking on Seventeenth street. Joseph Bailey, the superintendent of the street railway company, has fifty to sixty men and a number of teams tearing the old track out and putting down a new double track on the opposite side of the street. The people on the north side of the street have complained of the track being too close to their fence lines. The city council ordered the track moved.

In order to take charge of the big business of the Four-State Fair, the street railway company has decided to double track Seventeenth street to the Fair grounds.

This order of the council to move the tracks has caused trouble in the camp of the electric light and telephone companies who had their poles set wrong.

A look at Seventeenth street will show a street all torn up with about 100 men working for the various companies.

Superintendent Bailey was asked if he would have the double track ready for the fireworks Saturday evening and he laughed and said it would begin to rain next Saturday at 5 o'clock and continue for four hours.

### PAY CAR FOR RAILROAD BOYS

**REAPPEARANCE OF THE OLD-TIME VISITOR TO OGDEN.**

Had on Board Money for the Employees of the Union Pacific—Southern Pacific Checks Arrive.

The Union Pacific pay car arrived from the east last night, and, after paying off local employees of the system, left for the east this morning. The arrival of the old-time pay car these days is an unusual feature and attracts more than ordinary attention owing to the fact that all checks are usually sent to local Union Pacific officials and are then distributed to employees in this city and trainmen running in and out of Ogden.

In order to keep directly in touch with the thousands of employees on the system, however, and to prevent anything in the nature of "straw men" being carried on the rolls of the various departments, the old and time-honored pay car and paymaster are sent over the entire road to check up and straighten out any tangles that may have occurred from the check system in vogue.

The Southern Pacific pay checks also arrived this morning and the work of distributing these to the hundreds of employees of that system in Ogden has kept officials busy all day. The aggregate amount paid out in this city by the Harriman roads this month will reach a large sum and this will increase as the season advances.

He is believed to have greatly influenced the girl to leave with him after he wronged her, as she seemed to be entirely under his control. Formal charges will be filed today.
