SLEEPY DRUNK THOUGHT HE SAW MANY PETTICOATS. SEVENTEEN-YEAR-OLD GIRL TESTIFIES AGAINST HIM.

Had a Dream Which Landed Him in the City Jail—Drank Beer to Cool His System.

B. D. Dreg, who pleaded not guilty to a charge of drunkenness Saturday had his trial this morning. He was fined \$2 or two days.

Jailor Anderson testified that the man was well under the influence of the liquor when brought into the station.

Dreg said that he had drained the "dregs" of two glasses of beer, but that he was not drunk, just sleepy.

"Yes, judge, I did take two beers just to cool my system," he said.

"You mean two kegs," replied the judge.

"No, just two glasses," declared the prisoner, "and it made me so powerful sleepy, I never did wake up until I got in that dog-gone bird cage. And the funny part of it was, I was dreaming all the time that I had bought a red touring car, filled it up with women, turned on the steam and told the driver to never stop her again.

Watt Reese, the handcuff performer, who attracted large crowds at a local theater a few weeks ago, had his preliminary hearing this morning. His bonds were fixed at \$1,000.

Reese is alleged to have committed a statutory crime against a 17-year-old girl, residing at Kaysville.

The girl in the case testified this morning that she had accompanied him to Logan, expecting to get a position in a moving picture house.

Reese asserts that he uses morphine, and while under the influence of the drug, has no control over what he says or does.

BALLINGER AND PINCHOT DISAGREE

Spokane, Aug. 8.—A war of words in prospect between Gifford Pinchot, United States forester, on the one side and Richard A. Ballinger, secretary of the interior, on the other, over the forestry policies of Theodore Roosevelt was the all-absorbing topic about the hotel lobbies tonight on the eve of opening of the National Irrigation congress.

The feeling was expressed that if the question of forest reservation is brought up Mr. Pinchot will defend the Roosevelt policy of removing forest lands from the possibility of public entry, and that if he does this Mr. Ballinger immediately will defend his policy of demanding that much of the lands thus closed be thrown open.

There is much feeling over the matter and the prospect of a clash between Roosevelt's policies and the alleged determination of Ballinger to cross them has brought discussion to fever heat. Criticism has also been expressed of the action of Mr. Ballinger in refusing further to permit settlers on arid lands to apply the value of their labor on irrigation projects under way.

This policy was inaugurated by Mr. Roosevelt in aid of settlers and it is urged that the refusal to continue the policy works a hardship on many settlers who have no other means of realizing the fruits of irrigation for which they have waited, in some cases, for several years.

It is expected that Mr. Ballinger will express himself upon this point.
