**ROBBED OF \$350
BY ACQUAINTANCE**

After spending the evening with a party composed of two women and a man, chance acquaintances whom he met on his way to Ogden, J. A. Swanson, a wealthy cattle dealer of Soda Springs, Idaho, found that he had been robbed of a roll of money containing \$350 when he awoke yesterday morning in his room at a local hotel.

On the train which arrived here from the north the afternoon before Swanson met the three strangers and engaged in conversation with them. After learning that their destination was the same as his own, the party decided to spend the evening together.

A draft for \$50 which he had in his pockets with the money was not taken by the person who robbed him.

**NO VINEGAR IN
MARKET OF STATE**

"Please give me a dime's worth of diluted acetic acid."
This is what you should ask your grocer, if you wish to save him from embarrassment. If you ask him for vinegar, he will if he is a strictly honest grocer, and lives up to the letter of the law, probably tell you, that he has no vinegar, but can sell you diluted acetic acid.
According to Willard Hansen, state food and dairy commissioner, there is no vinegar in the market of the state, and the sour stuff that is now being sold as vinegar is diluted acetic acid.
The output of the vinegar factories of the state, in malt and fruit vinegars was entirely inadequate to the needs of the market. The enforcement of the law requiring the manufacturers to label their so called vinegars as dil-

luted acetic acid has caused a great shortage in the market, which is only now being filled by shipments from other parts of the country.
Investigation is to be made by the state food and dairy commissioner into the methods of grocers who sell the acid, and it will be insisted that the acid sell as acid and not as vinegar.
Orders have been given that thousands of barrels of the diluted acetic acid be so labeled, and violations of the order will be prosecuted.

WASHINGTON CROP BULLETINS.
Washington, Oct. 8.—The preliminary estimate of the average yield per acre of Spring wheat is 15.9 bushels, as compared with 13.2 bushels, the final estimate in 1908; of oats about 30.3 bushels as compared with 25.9 bushels last year and of barley about 23.9 bushels against 25.1 a year ago.
The quality of barley is 83.5 against 89.30 last year with an indicated total yield of 164,636,000 bushels against 166,756,000 final estimate in 1908.
The average condition of other crops is stated as follows:
Buckwheat, 73.5 at harvest against 81.6 last year.
Potatoes, 78.8 on Oct. 1, against 68.7.
Flax seed, 84.9 at harvest, against 81.2, with South Dakota 87.
Apples, 43.3, October 1, against 48.
