MILWAUKEE TO MAKE

NO THROUGH RATE Seattle, Nov. 4.—According to announcement made at the offices of the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound Railway here today, the Milwaukee system, after November 24, will make no through rate on Oriental traffic, following the policy of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific systems in publishing a rate from Chicago to Seattle.

In doing this the Milwaukee, it is said, will receive the same rate on freight consigned to the Orient that it now receives on freight consigned to Pacific coast points. Heretofore the railroads' share of the through Oriental rate has been less than the rate received on Pacific coast business. The other transcontinental lines discontinued the publishing of through Oriental rates following an order of the Interstate Commerce commission requiring them to make public the portion of the through rate received by the railroads in the matter of assisting mariners in distress.

For this purpose the cutters have been stationed along the Washington, Oregon and California coasts, and each has been given particular cruising orders.

The Tahoma will be in Puget sound and the vicinity of Cape Henry; the Snohomish at Neah Bay, Wash., in the straits of Fuca; the Manning at Astoria, Ore.; the McCulloch at San Francisco; the Perry at San Pedro, California; the Bear at San Diego and the Thetis at Honolulu.

REVENUE CUTTERS ARE ASSIGNED TO NEW STATIONS. Washington, Nov. 4.—All revenue cutters on the Pacific coast have been assigned to new stations since their return from the Bering Sea and the Arctic ocean.

A new system for cruising these vessels has been inaugurated with the intention of making every vessel of special value to shipping interests in the matter of assisting mariners in distress.

To create Childs Avenue from 29th Street South 347.42 in. ft. to 29th line of Childs Addition as a sewer district, and to build therein pipe sewers 8 inches in diameter, connecting with the manholes of the present sewer system, and with such manholes as may be necessary and to defray the costs and expenses of the same, estimated at \$700.00, by a local assessment for a depth of 132 feet upon the lots, blocks, parts of lots and blocks, lands and real estate being within said district abutting and bounding upon the outer boundary lines of said street.
