

POSTHOLE AUGER

Jaws Descend Straight Into Earth
and Make Clean Holes.

An invention that will be found useful
by fence-makers and farmers generally, is
the post-hole auger designed by a Michi-
gan man. This implement digs a narrow,
fence or other post and digs it quickly.
It appears the auger resembles a
clean hole, just the right diameter for a
huge auger of the ordinary carpenter's
kit. It is pressed down into the earth,
the jaws taking in the amount of dirt a
post would require, and then with
drawn, bringing up the dirt just as a
dredger would. Indeed, the implement

works much like a dredging machine.
The advantage of the auger is in the
small, clean hole it makes. Without
it a post hole must be dug with a spade
and the smallest spade not only makes
a hole too big, but one that necessarily
chests from the dirt to the bottom and
must be filled again. It is easy to
understand that a post will stand much
more firmly in a hole that does not have
to be filled in.

POSTOFFICE ROBBERS ARE SENTENCED.

St. Louis, Nov. 9.—Three men, who
postoffice inspectors declare, are mem-
bers of a band of robbers which has
stolen large sums in Missouri,
Oklahoma and surrounding states,
pleaded guilty today of robbing the
Wellsville, Mo., postoffice, and were
sentenced to terms in prison.

1909, to appropriate six (6) cubic-feet
per second of water from Cold Water
Creek, Weber County, Utah. Said
water will be diverted at a point 20
feet above the present Ogden City's
water pipe, from which the west quar-
ter corner of Section 19, Township 6
north, Range 1 east, Salt Lake base
and meridian, bears north 60 degrees

of a pipe line for a distance of 20,000
feet and there used from January 1
to December 31, inclusive, of each
year, by the inhabitants residing in
Section 24, Township 6 north, Range
1 west, Salt Lake base and meridian
and the public resorts located in said
section for domestic and municipal
purposes. This application is desig-
nated in the State Engineer's office as
