

### CAPTURE OF THE BECRAFT BURGLAR

One of the cleverest bits of detective work done in this city for some time was done by Detective James Pender and Captain C. C. Brown yesterday, when they captured the burglar that broke into Becraft's store early last Tuesday morning.

Captain Brown and Detective Pender were looking around in a Twenty-fifth-street pawn shop yesterday, when they spied a very costly, folding automatic revolver. The questioned the boy keeper and found that he had been brought to the place the day before. Taking the gun to Mr. Becraft, he identified it, after which they returned to the pawn shop and the proprietor gave them a good description of the man who had placed the gun in pawn.

After they had received a good description of the man they walked the streets and kept their eyes open for some one who looked like the man that pawned the gun. As they were walking along Twenty-fifth street a man came along who answered the description, they at once took him over to the station and searched him. The pawn tickets and a very fine diamond glass cutter were found.

Later, in the chief's private office, he confessed to the robbery.

Giving his name as William Lindsay, he said that after cutting one window he felt around, but found nothing that he liked, went to the other, cut that one and found only the gun that he thought of any value.

### HUNTSVILLE UNCERTAIN OF ITS LEGAL STATUS

When is a city not a city? The age of Ann, the North Pole controversy, or the accurate length of the tail of Halle's comet, are more commonplace problems compared with the perplexing question which confronts the residents of Huntsville just at this time.

Wants to Disincorporate. A month ago a majority of the taxpayers of the little city concluded that the honor of living in a municipality with a mayor, city council and other dignitaries necessary to take care of the civic machinery, did not balance up with the onerous burden of taxation which became necessary to maintain a city government. Accordingly a petition was presented to the district court asking permission to vote on the matter of disincorporating the city at the recent election.

Judge Howat issued an order restraining the city recorder of Huntsville to prepare the voting machine in such a manner as to enable the voters to express themselves on the matter by voting "yes" or "no."

When the vote was counted on the night of the election the judges found that 33 votes had been recorded in favor of disincorporation and 23 votes had been recorded on the negative side of the question, notwithstanding the fact that the entire vote cast totaled 73. Eleven votes had to be disregarded, because they were found to be recorded in blank. The other 33 votes could not be accounted for. The judges decided that the machine had been locked when the polls opened in such a manner that it was impossible to leave the voting booth until a vote on the question had been recorded, but in this they erred.

Election Results Undecided. The knotted problem which now confronts the people of Huntsville is, whether or not they are living under municipal laws or are governed by the county officials in the same manner as other settlements of the state which are not incorporated. The statute of the state requires that a majority of the total vote cast at a regular election must be in favor of disincorporation before such an action can be declared legal. As 33 votes lack, consideration of being a majority of the total vote, it now looks that Huntsville will be a city until another election is held.

### IMPROVED FIRE SYSTEM HAS BEEN INSTALLED

One of the latest improved fire protection systems in the world is being installed by the Manufacturers company of New York in Wright's department store. These systems are being used in all the large stores east and west and are reducing the losses by fire enormously. They are said to be worth the cost of installation by the amount of money saved in insurance.

The system consists of pipes run through the store over each table. The pipes are connected with the street water mains and there is also a large tank in the back of the building which holds 20,000 gallons of water. Heads are placed twenty feet apart. These heads are made of a substance which is highly susceptible to heat and when subjected to a certain temperature suddenly opens and the water is sprayed on and around the stock for a space of twenty feet.

The tank which is being erected by Wrights will reach a height of about ninety feet. The frame, which is of the best construction steel, is seventy-seven feet in height and the tank will tower about fifteen feet higher than the frame. The tank has a capacity of 20,000 gallons and in case of a water shortage this can be relied upon.

There are connections with the street, through six inch mains both on the east and the south sides of the store. When the heads reach a certain temperature they open and release the cut-out valves on the street main and it is practically impossible for the fire to make any headway.

On the east and south sides of the building there will be placed two large gongs. As soon as the fire in the store starts, these gongs will ring and both the engineer in the building and the fire department will be warned of the spread of the flames. In the Wright store there will be 260 heads each twenty feet apart, and should fire break out, the place would be pretty well soaked. The installation of this system will, it is thought, reduce the fire insurance on the place to about one third. The system will cost \$8,000.

### BEN SAILOR HAS HIS HEARING IN SALT LAKE

Ben Sailor, who was arrested by the police of this city, on the charge of removing money from registered mail, had his hearing yesterday before the federal grand jury in Salt Lake. He will likely plead guilty to the charge and start immediately to serve his term at Fort Leavenworth, the federal prison.

Sailor, who is an Ogden man, was caught stealing the mail by means of marked parcels. The officials had received many complaints about mail being stolen from the Malad branch and suspected Sailor of the thefts. They addressed some marked letters to Malad and placed them on the same train as Sailor was working on. When the train arrived at Malad, Sailor was searched and the money which had been taken from the letters was found in his pockets. The hearing will last probably until tomorrow.

### TABERNALE CONCERT TO BE GIVEN FRIDAY

The concert to be given at the Tabernacle, Tuesday evening, November 9, as a benefit for the Seventh Ward meeting house and under the auspices of the Columbian Conservatory of Music, was postponed on account of the severe storm prevailing at that time. There were several hundred tickets sold, and it was deemed fair to those who had purchased tickets to proceed with the concert.

The concert will be given Friday, Nov. 12, at 8:15 p. m.

### CHARLES D. HOWELL POSITIVELY IDENTIFIED

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 10.—Mail Clerk Benjamin L. Stumps positively identified Charles D. Howell today as the man who boarded a Great Northern mail car at Bannock, Idaho, on March 15, impersonated an inspector and looted the registered mail.

Stumps quickly picked out Howell from among four prisoners as the man who locked Mail Clerk B. W. Nystuen in a closet, tied Stumps in a chair with a mail sack over his head and acted as clerk limit until the train reached Spokane, where he jumped off, taking with him the registered mail.

Howell, who was formerly postmaster at Havre, Mont., and recently was proprietor of the Kneeland hotel, Olympia, Wash., is still in jail here in default of \$20,000 bail to answer the charge of holding up the Great Northern express here last month, obtaining \$12,000 in cash. His connection with the robbery was established last week, when Nystuen identified him.

### CITY COUNCIL IN SPECIAL SESSION

Friday evening a meeting of the city council as a committee of the whole, will be held to discuss a petition from Simon Bamberger, president of the Salt Lake & Ogden Railroad company, which was presented to the council Monday night asking permission to back the trams of the company through Lincoln avenue to Twenty-fifth street where the new depot of the company will be located.

Property owners on Lincoln avenue and representatives of the railroad company are requested to be present at the special meeting Friday night. The franchise granted to the Salt Lake & Ogden Railroad company in Ogden city expressly provides that only electric cars shall be run through the streets of the city. President Bamberger in his petition declares that he is only asking this concession temporarily. There has been some delay in electrifying the road, and as the company is anxious to reach the center of the city as nearly as possible, permission is asked to temporarily run the regular trams through Lincoln avenue until the work of electrifying the road is completed.

At the adjourned session of the council last night ordinances creating sidewalk district No. 105 and the amended ordinance creating paving district No. 100 passed their third and final readings. The sidewalk district comprises Barlow avenue from Twenty-sixth to Twenty-seventh streets. The paving district embraces those blocks in the heart of the business district of the city which are now being laid with asphaltum by Pat Moran, the Salt Lake contractor.

Upon the recommendation of the sidewalk committee, the contract for sidewalk improvements in district 103 was awarded to the J. P. O'Neill Construction company, the lowest bidder. The district embraces a portion of the Stephens addition to the city. The O'Neill company bid \$6,700.

Claims for damages against the city for personal injuries alleged to have been received by C. C. Wilson and D. D. Gratton were denied upon the recommendation of the law committee. Wilson claimed that he sustained injuries by falling into an excavation at the corner of Adams avenue and Twenty-seventh street. The law committee reported that he had not presented his claim within the time required by the law. Gratton's claim was for injuries which he declares he received by falling over a wire on Washington avenue which had been strung along the street during the time President Taft was a visitor to Ogden.

The city auditor was instructed to pay to J. S. Troy \$250, the amount of the deposit made by H. H. Melvor at the time he petitioned for a retail liquor license at the fair grounds, which was afterwards denied. Upon the recommendation of the license committee Troy is required to furnish a bond for \$500 to protect the city in the payment of the money to him, Melvor having left Ogden and assigned the money to Troy.

Monthly reports from the city sexton, the poll tax collector, the street department, the water supply department and the public buildings and grounds department were received and filed.

The filing of the municipal court reported that \$1,556.10 had been collected by the court during the past month in fines, forfeitures and fees in civil cases. The sanitary inspector reported that there are now 21 cases of contagious diseases in the city.

A final estimate due the Wheelwright Construction company, amounting to \$2,249 for sidewalks and guttering in District 105 was referred to the sidewalk committee. A claim from the same company for work on intersections amounting to \$376.09 was ordered paid. A second partial estimate due the Pat Moran Construction company for paving in District 100 is \$18,057.91 was referred to the street committee.

Petitions for arc lights on Thirty-first street and Grant avenue, on Seventeenth street and Ogden avenue, on Second street and Wall avenue, and on Tenth street and Washington avenue were referred to the light committee.

The Park Commission recommended that the trees on Twenty-fourth street between Lincoln and Grant avenues be cut down. Some of the councilmen believed that since the commission has authority to act without the council's sanction in such matters, the communication should be filed with the city attorney, however, was instructed to submit a report on the matter.

Councilman Powers declared that some portions of Twenty-fourth street between Washington and Grant avenues had the appearance of having been gone over by prospectors. The matter was referred to City Engineer Parker with instructions to inform those responsible for the torn up condition of the street to make the necessary repairs. On motion of Councilman Peery, the city engineer was instructed to submit estimates of the cost of repairing the paving in the paving districts of the city. The city engineer was also instructed to notify the Ogden Rapid Transit company to lay the paving between its tracks in the paving districts of the city at once.

### SECURITIES REMAIN UNDER RESTRAINT

After remaining separated for twenty-four hours, A. J. Johnson, who says he is a traveling shoe salesman from Denver, and his bride were happily reunited in Ogden yesterday. Johnson was in the smoking compartment of a westbound train in which he had begun his honeymoon trip when the train reached Ogden Tuesday afternoon. Seeing his wife talking to a stranger, and believing that she had met up with an old acquaintance, he went back to the smoking room to finish his cigar. When the train reached Salt Lake the bride had disappeared. Through the train went Johnson like a madman, looking for his wife, but she was gone. Leaving the Salt Lake depot he hurried to the police station and sought the assistance of the capital city police in the search for his wife. Johnson told the police that his wife was near-sighted and that he was of the opinion that some man who resembled him and imposed upon the credulity of his newly-wedded spouse and had induced her to leave the train with him. All night Tuesday he kept up the frantic search.

Mrs. Johnson was equally perturbed after leaving the train at Ogden and not being able to find her husband. She had alighted when some of her fellow passengers told her that they had seen Johnson get off the train. Seeing the stories of the affair in yesterday morning's papers, Mrs. Johnson sent a long-distance message to the Salt Lake police station and word was sent to Johnson. The latter caught the next train for Ogden and the couple were reunited at the Union depot here.

Johnson gave his occupation as a shoe drummer to the Salt Lake police with the Denver address of his wife. A dispatch from Denver late last night said that neither of the principals were known there. The address given as that of the bride was found to be a vacant lot. Inquiry at the shoe houses of Denver elicited no information regarding Johnson.

It is believed that Johnson gave the police an assumed name and address to prevent notoriety. Word was received from Salt Lake last night that Johnson had sworn off smoking, at least while traveling.

### POOL ROOMS LOSE HEAVILY BY WORK OF WIRE-TAPPERS

From dispatches received here yesterday, it is asserted that between \$50,000 and \$70,000 was cleaned up at Denver and Salt Lake Tuesday by a cleverly planned scheme of wire tapping which is believed to have been executed near the Latonia race track in Ohio.

Most of the money was taken down on odds which were quoted 7 to 1 on Howard Pearson, the winner of the sixth race at the Latonia track, but which were boosted to 20 and even as high as 40 to 1.

The tip on the horse apparently was general and nearly every bookmaker in Denver lost heavily. Some of them refused to pay bets on the horse yesterday. Bookmakers in the pool rooms of Salt Lake deny that they were involved and declared that the false odds sent in at post time by the wire tappers were not posted on their boards.

Officials of the Latonia track say that they will start a rigorous investigation into the alleged wire tapping today. It is rumored that wire tapping at Latonia has been carried on for some time notwithstanding the efforts of the authorities to trace its origin.
