### GLEASON ON HIS WAY WEST

TOM PAINTER URGED AS REFEREE OF BIG FIGHT.

Evanson Boosters Meet the Fight Promoters—One of the Fighters May Train in Canyon.

John J. Gleason, one of the promoters of the Jeffries-Johnson fight with "Tex" Rickard, passed through Ogden at 11:35 o'clock last night en route to San Francisco. Owing to the late hour Mr. Gleason was not to be seen.

A number of the Utah and Wyoming friends of Tom Painter, of Evanson, who are using their efforts to have him chosen as referee of the bout met Mr. Gleason when the train passed through Evanson last night and urged the selection of Mr. Painter.

In Salt Lake City, Painter is well known and stands high among the managers on account of his clean and fair methods in conducting fight. It is stated that many of the business men of Salt Lake City, who are backing Rickard and Gleason, have expressed their approval of Painter and will use their efforts to have him chosen as the referee of the big fight.

In Ogden, Painter's reputation as a square referee who will not allow any "take" in the ring, is even stronger than in Salt Lake City.

Painter has been chosen as referee of the Sullivan-Collins contest, which will be held in Ogden on January 7th, during the Wool Growers' convention. In connection with the fight as well as the convention, Mr. Painter has been doing a great amount of boosting among the wool growers of Wyoming and has assured the local committees that he will bring a big crowd to Ogden for the convention.

The announcement in Boston yesterday afternoon by "Tex" Rickard that the Jeffries-Johnson fight would be pulled off in Salt Lake City and that he had been assured that there would be no opposition on the part of the state or city officials has been received with delight by the local fight fans.

An effort will be made to have one of the principals of the bout train at The Oaks in Ogden canyon. Manager C. S. Potter of that resort offers training quarters, accommodations and board for the fighter and trainers. As the Oaks has been used as training quarters on numerous occasions by fighters in training for big bouts, it is possible that one of the principals will come to Ogden.

### BOUND OVER TO HIGHER COURT

DAVID WOODS MUST ANSWER FOR FORGERY.

He is the Negro Who Admits He Was With the Slayer of Officer Riley in Salt Lake.

David Woods, a negro, charged with the crime of forgery, had his preliminary hearing before the municipal judge this morning and was bound over to await the action of the district court in the sum of \$500. The complaint in the case charges that Woods and a man by the name of Williams, on the 10th day of October, forged the name of J. T. Ritter, an indorser, to a certain check on the First National bank of this city, amounting to \$15.42. Williams is not under arrest, he having made his "getaway" some time ago.

The defendant in this case is connected, by his own admissions, with the killing of Officer Riley of Salt Lake some time ago. He says that he was across the street from where the officer was shot, and that he witnessed the shooting, which, he claims, was done by Driscoll, who is now awaiting trial in Salt Lake for the crime. Woods also implicates a man by the name of Kennedy, who was an associate of Driscoll. Both Driscoll and Kennedy, it will be remembered, were connected with certain burglaries in Ogden and Salt Lake, and the two men were arrested here.

FERRY BOAT OVERDUE AND MAY BE LOST.

Conneaut, Ohio, Dec. 10.—Car ferry No. 2 plying between here and Port Stanley, Ont., with a crew of 25 men is sixty hours overdue, and it is feared she has met with disaster. The fact that the boat is long past due and that wreckage was reported off Long Point by the steamer W. B. Davock adds to the fears.

In addition to the wreckage sighted the Davock also saw a sawl, painted green and half filled with water, floating near Erie, Pa. The yawls of the car ferry are painted green.
