Vienna, May 19.—Commander Robert E. Peery's lecture here last night was attended by the cabinet ministers and many people prominent in Austrian life. At the close of the lecture, the gold medal of the Imperial Geographical society was presented to Commander Peery and a banquet was given in his honor.

Commander Peery will go to Budapest today and on Friday he will be received in audience by the emperor, who has signified his extreme pleasure at the prospect of meeting the explorer.

IMPROVEMENT LEAGUE MEETS

A special meeting of the board of directors of the Ogden City Improvement league was held last evening in the Weber club rooms for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year.

The following officers were chosen: Angus T. Wright, president; Archie P. Bigelow, first vice president; H. C. Baker, second vice president; J. S. Lewis, secretary; J. J. Brummitt, treasurer.

The new directors chosen are D. W. Ellis, H. C. Baker, A. Q. Campbell, Willard Scowcroft and H. L. Harrington, the latter being chosen to succeed Harold Peery, resigned.

After declaring to appoint a committee to co-operate with a similar committee recently appointed by the Weber club, the following resolutions were unanimously passed:

Investigate Plan.
Whereas, this league has for several years worked earnestly for an improved municipal government, without result, for our city; and
Whereas, state senators and representatives for the next legislature are soon to be elected; and
Whereas, it is expedient that this league at once take steps to formulate a modern municipal government either commission or otherwise, and support such nominees as will pledge themselves to faithfully work for such reform; therefore, be it
Resolved, That the chairman appoint a committee of three to investigate and report at an early date, upon such modified or commission plan of municipal city government as will be suitable for our city, irrespective of what other cities of the state may do, and that, if desired, this committee be and are hereby authorized and empowered to employ legal assistance at the expense of this league, if necessary, in the furtherance of this work.

Remove the Poles.
Whereas, the multitude of electric light, telephone and trolley poles, with live wires of high voltage, upon Washington avenue, the main thoroughfare of our city, are unsightly and dangerous to life and property; and
Whereas, this league recommends and approves that all such poles on Washington avenue from Twenty-second to Twenty-sixth streets be removed at an early date and that iron column poles with cluster lights to each pole be placed along such street, with extended center connection by wire from pole to pole across the street for trolley wires, with underground wiring for cluster lights; and
Whereas, the cost of installing such improvement shall be borne pro rata by property owners and the Rapid Transit company along the said proposed district, and
Whereas, to make this improvement it is hereby resolved that a committee of three, be appointed by the chairman, with full power to take such action necessary to carry on this work and obtain if necessary legal services in the furtherance of this substantial improvement.

It was also voted to address a letter to the county commissioners commending them for the excellent work which has been done on the Davis county road, south of the city.

The meeting was then adjourned.
