Johnson Has No Equal --Deep Gloom Around Jim Jeffries

Reno, Nev., July 5.—Reno is as busy disgorging the fight crowds today as it was on Saturday and Sunday...

The restaurants are still limited to rather scanty bills-of-fare, and the hotels uncomfortably full...

Here and there, where groups of fight experts still linger on the shady side of the principal streets...

No One to Meet Johnson. With Johnson the one undisputed world's champion, the next question is who will wrest it from him?

No one knows just how many people saw the big fight or what the gate receipts were.

No Yellow Streak. In all the fight talk and the discussion of yesterday afternoon's event, one thing stands out sharply...

His statement given out at his quarters last evening had been well thought out, but his remarks, as he slipped back to his corner after Jeffries had been battered down...

Johnson Was Confident. As his seconds and friends and the newspapermen crowded about him...

Jeffries' people had little to say. They were too sorely hurt and disappointed. Jim Corbett, who was Jeffries' chief adviser...

Corbett's Statement. "It was simply the old story of the pitcher and the 'went too often'."

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The big fellow thought himself fight and he must have been or he could not feel as well as he does after that beating...

his courage and his condition that kept him there as long as he stayed. He Lacked Speed.

Frank Gotch sized Jeffries up as follows: "Jeffries' head and his heart were right, but his hands and feet were not."

Not the Jeffries of Old. "The Jeffries of Monday was not the Jeffries of old. An absence from the game for six years made the atmosphere of the ring as new to him as it is to a raw amateur..."

Jeffries Hides. True to his character, the vanquished fighter remained hidden from the gaze of the chance visitors.

Packing occupied the reduced staff at the training camp during the night and morning. Jeffries reiterated his purpose of departing for his home in California as soon as his arrangements could be perfected...

At the resort where the new champion prepared for his great fight, there was little to indicate that he had ever been there.

Johnson's Departure. Johnson's departure from here was delayed until almost 2 o'clock this morning by a tie-up in the railroad trains.

Only a few people were present when the champion left. There was a little cheering and the negro came out on the rear platform of the train and bowed to the crowd.

Returned to the cottage. Jeffries went out to the lawn and sat down with his head hanging down and his eyes fixed on the ground.

Both Made Money. Jack Johnson was \$120,000 richer when Jim Jeffries went down for the last time in yesterday's fight.

Jeffries took a fortune out of the defeat at Johnson's hands. He got 40 per cent of the purse, amounting to \$10,000; the bonus of \$10,000 and he sold his picture interests for \$50,000.

After the program at the pavilion a baseball game was played at the ball park between the Thompsonites and Silverites for a prize of \$10, the former being victors by a score of 11 to 3.

Mrs. John Hupfer, manager of the opera house, treated the children to a free picture show and in the afternoon a free dance, with free distribution of candy, nuts, fruit, lemonade, etc., was given by the members of the local lodge of Elks and each child had all their little hearts desired.

For the amusement of the older folks a baseball game, International Smelter vs. Eureka, was played at the Athletic park.

The festivities of the day wound up with a grand ball at the pavilion.
