A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 1 OF ARTICLE XIV OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF UTAH IN RELATION TO THE LIMIT OF THE STATE INDEBTEDNESS.

Section 1. That it is proposed to amend Section 1, of Article 14, of the constitution of the State of Utah, so that the same shall read as follows:

Section 4. When authorized to create indebtedness as provided in Section 3 of this Article, no county shall become indebted to an amount, including existing indebtedness, exceeding four per centum of the value of the taxable property therein, the value to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and County purposes, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness; except that in incorporated cities the assessment shall be taken from the last assessment for city purposes; provided that no part of the indebtedness allowed in this section shall be incurred for other than strictly county, city, town or school district purposes; provided further, that any city of the first and second class, when authorized as provided in Section three of this article, may be allowed to incur a larger indebtedness, not to exceed four per centum and any city of the third class, or town, not to exceed eight per centum additional, for supplying such city or town with water, artificial lights or sewers, when the works for supplying such water, light and sewers, shall be owned and controlled by the municipality.

Section 2. The Secretary of State is directed to cause this proposed amendment to be published as required by the Constitution and to be submitted to the electors of the State at the next general election in the manner provided by law.

Section 3. If approved by the electors of the State, this proposed amendment shall take effect on the first day of January, 1911.

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 4 OF ARTICLE X OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF UTAH, IN RELATION TO THE LIMIT OF INDEBTEDNESS OF COUNTIES, CITIES, TOWNS AND SCHOOL DISTRICTS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF UTAH, TWO-THIRDS OF ALL MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH OF THE TWO HOUSES CONCURRENCE THEREIN: Section 1. That it is proposed to amend Section 4, of Article 14, of the constitution of the State of Utah, so that the same shall read as follows:

Section 4. When authorized to create indebtedness as provided in Section 3 of this Article, no county shall become indebted to an amount, including existing indebtedness, exceeding four per centum of the value of the taxable property therein, the value to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and County purposes, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness; except that in incorporated cities the assessment shall be taken from the last assessment for city purposes; provided that no part of the indebtedness allowed in this section shall be incurred for other than strictly county, city, town or school district purposes; provided further, that any city of the first and second class, when authorized as provided in Section three of this article, may be allowed to incur a larger indebtedness, not to exceed four per centum and any city of the third class, or town, not to exceed eight per centum additional, for supplying such city or town with water, artificial lights or sewers, when the works for supplying such water, light and sewers, shall be owned and controlled by the municipality.

Section 2. The Secretary of State is directed to cause this proposed amendment to be published as required by the Constitution and to be submitted to the electors of the State at the next general election in the manner provided by law.

Section 3. If approved by the electors of the State, this proposed amendment shall take effect on the first day of January, 1911.

WALL STREET CONTINUES DULL

Rapid Marketing of New Grain is Furnishing Means of Liquidation for Farmers.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—The desirability of conserving money resources for the fall is a prime factor in the present stagnation of the stock market.

The rapid marketing of new grain, it is believed, is supplying resources to farmers for liquidation of loans in land and auto purchases and the favorable effect is looked for in the returns of national banks of condition on September 1, which are now being compiled by the controller. Bonds irregular. Sales \$665,500. U. S. bonds unchanged on call.

CHICAGO GRAIN.

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Raiding by elevator concerns and by professional speculators had a share in pulling down wheat prices. Bulls were somewhat taken back by private cable dispatches to the effect that Russia was offering wheat at figures equal to 7 1/8@8c under Cricaco.

Further assurance came in the shape of a report that 20 boatloads had been delivered for export at the Atlantic coast, December ranged from 99 1/4 to \$1.00 3/4, with final sales at 99 3/8 to 99 3/8@1 1/2, a net loss of 1 1/2@5 to 3-4.

December corn fluctuated between 54 3/4 and 55 1/2, with the close steady at 54 3/4 to 54 3/4@7 1/2, with a net loss of 1 1/2@2 1/2.

December oats varied from 34 5/8 to 34 7/8, closing 14@38 down at 34 5/8@3-4.

Provisions closed 2 1/2 to 7 1/2 up for pork, 2 1/2 to 5c higher for lard and ribs 5c lower.
